Mike's brutal Spine Race challenge to raise money for former BAE colleague and friend



Mike Gregory is taking on one of the toughest endurance races in the world to help his friend and former Astute colleague Alan Towart. Alan, who used to work on Boat 6 as a Mechanical Team Leader, was diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease back in 2017.



Mike wants to support Alan's chosen charities and his

family as best he can, and is taking part in the Winter Spine race to raise money for St Mary's Hospice, Ulverston, and the Motor Neurone Disease Association. Consisting of a brutal 268-mile start to finish race up the Pennine Way in January, from Edale, in the Peak District, to Kirk Yetholm in Scotland, the Winter Spine represents a formidable challenge.

Competitors have seven days to complete the distance, carrying their own equipment (sleeping bag system, warm clothes, food, emergency equipment the lot!) to survive outdoors in the depths of winter and with an average of just eight hours daylight per day.

Having worked in the military for 18 years and being an accomplished cyclist and triathlete, the 45-year-old is used to tough physical challenges. The Winter Spine will be one of his most challenging assignments to date and he is training hard in preparation.

Juggling his work and family life (Mike is married with children) is tricky and his training regime often sees him running around Grange at the crack of dawn before catching the train to Barrow to work, or cycling 25 miles home after a day's shift as an Operations Leader in Barrow.

Mike also spends many hours of his weekend free time running over the Yorkshire Dales or Lake District fells carrying a heavy backpack to replicate what it will be like when he sets off along the Pennine Way on Sunday 14 January. With a high percentage of athletes ending up as 'DNFs' (meaning Did Not Finish) just completing the Spine will be a great achievement, but Mike is determined to get home in five days – especially as his birthday is on the Friday (19th)!

Looking forward to 2024....?

At the end of the calendar year, it is always worth taking time to look at what changes may be coming in 2024.

In November's Autumn Statement, reductions in National Insurance Contributions, permanent expensing of plant and machinery investment costs, extension of business rates relief, and freezing of alcohol duties were among notable tax measures. Walk of the Month

With Grange Ramblers



A walk generally on good paths, along the River Brathay, past Elterwater to Little Langdale.

DISTANCE: 5.5 Miles

DIFFICULTY: Easy, with ascent 900 feet.

TIME (inc breaks): 4.5 hours

Start: National Trust car park - Elterwater Village.

Map ref: NY327046 (OL7)

DIRECTIONS

- 1/ From car park take riverside path towards Skelwith Bridge.
- 2/ Pass Elter Water, with good views to Langdale Pikes
- 3/ Cross metal footbridge over river, into wood.
- 4/ The path continues along river, before bending uphill to kissing gate.
- 5/ At an access road, turn right and pass some cottages. After two metal kissing gates, walk between buildings at Guest House, before descending on waymarked path.
- 6/ After two stiles and an enclosed path, go through gate onto path going diagonally across field. Path follows edge of steep drop to river, before descending to bank. Continue to road.
- 7/ Turn right along the road. After 80 yards turn left through two stiles (towards High Park). Then turn right to Colwith Force. Bear left up a rocky track. Keep right of a fenced area to a viewing point above the waterfall.

8/ Retrace your steps and turn right uphill after the fenced area. The wooded track leaves the river and goes uphill to a gate in a wall.

9/ Follow the wall to High Park Farm and turn left up to a road. Turn right along the road, through Stang End. The road turns into a track around the edge of a wood.

10/ At the river go straight ahead along the left bank, ignoring the footbridge on the right.

11/ Turn right through a kissing gate, to cross Slater Bridge. Walk uphill keeping to the left of a wall. At the top there are good views over Little Langdale Tarn. Turn left along the farm access road.

12/ At the end turn left and immediately right. After a farm continue along the rough path. Ignore paths and tracks on both sides. At the road turn left to return to Elterwater village.

Grange Natural History Society

2024 will be a big year for Grange DNHS, as the Society was formed 70 years ago, in March 1954. A special programme of events is being organised- see our web site and Facebook pages.

On 17 November 1954 Nigel Charles, who worked at Merlewood Research Station, gave a talk to the newly formed Grange DNHS on Bird Behaviour. On 17 November 2023 Dr Kevin Briggs gave a talk on Bird Behaviour to a capacity audience of GDNHS.

Kevin gave a fascinating account of his in-depth scientific studies of Oystercatchers. He explained that they should be called 'mussel pickers'- a mistranslation of a Dutch name. With black and white markings, and a long red bill and red eyes, they are attractive



and interesting birds. Historical records show that they were mostly coastal birds, feeding on mussels, cockles and limpets, but have adapted to eating earthworms on short grassland or arable fields. Oystercatchers have been intensively studied, with whole books and research tomes about them.

Kath Smith, Community & Engagement Officer for South Cumbria Rivers Trust (SCRT), explained that her enthusiasm for the natural world started with volunteering. SCRT is a small conservation charity, one of 60 across England, aiming to monitor and improve the quality of rivers and lakes in our area.

Rhubarb and blood orange crumble **INGREDIENTS**

- · 600g rhubarb, trimmed and cut into chunks
- 1 blood orange (or any orange)
- 50g golden caster sugar

For the crumble

- 100g chilled unsalted butter
- 180g plain flour
- 50g porridge oats
- · 100g golden caster or soft brown sugar

The start of the year brings two seasonal delights, forced rhubarb grown in Yorkshire and blood oranges, which make a very brief but much-appreciated appearance at the same time. This recipe brings them both together in a comforting pud that suits the season's weather.

If you lean towards the more savoury notes in life, there are other good options to look out for. We recommend Nigel Slater's light

lunch of beetroot and blood oranges or take your pick of the many recipes for beetroot and orange relish.

METHOD

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/fan160°C/gas 4. Put the rhubarb in a suitable pie or baking dish (it can be as shallow or deep as you like). Halve the orange around its 'equator' and squeeze the juice of one half over the rhubarb. Cut the other half in two, slice each quarter as thinly as you can, and add to the rhubarb. Add the sugar and mix everything together.
- 2. Make the crumble. Rub the butter, flour, and oats together with your fingers until gravelly. Fold in the caster or soft brown sugar. Top the rhubarb evenly with the crumble and bake for 30-40 minutes or until golden and bubbling.
- 3. Serve hot with Low Sizergh Barn custard.



The works of Cumbrian artists of the 20th Century command very respectable prices at auction, with one setting our all-time highest-price record in the autumn of last year. Here's a quick guide to those that catch buyers' eyes.



Our 2023 top lot was a particularly 'naive' looking portrayal of blue hyacinths, by the renowned and adopted Cumbrian artist, Winifred Nicholson (1893-1981), which made £48,000 with us. Nicholson sits alongside many other high-calibre and wellknown Cumbrian artists who attract keen buvers.

Take Sheila Fell (1931-1979), a West Cumbrian born from humble beginnings. Her often ominous landscape paintings, full of expressive brushwork and bold colour,

contrast drastically with the joyful, bright works of Winifred Nicholson. At auction, her paintings consistently make four to five figures.

The works of Percy Kelly (1918-1993) differ even more from the aforementioned, yet still bring about significant bidding at auction. Born in Workington, Kelly notably refused to sell his works during his later life, and their popularity soared following his death. He focused on the region's more understated areas, the fishing ports for example, and he has a very distinctive style.

Alfred Wainwright (1907-1991) needs no introduction. If you have an original pen and ink sketch of his, now is the time to consider selling one. Though his Lake District sketches fetch more, we've sold a good number of Scottish and Yorkshire drawings here in the last few months very successfully.

Then we have the likes of Tim Gustard (b.1954) and Pat Cleary (20th Century). The former produces exquisitely detailed still life paintings, pleasing to the eye, and the latter executed paintings of the Lake District, its farming and industrial landscape, roughly and expressively. Just recently, we sold a magnificent painting of Honister Slate Mine in winter, by Cleary, which sold for £600.

These are only a handful of names. Other artists include June Bennett (1935-2013), the Heaton Coopers, and Julian Cooper (b.1947).





Obituary from Robina Dexter

David Duncan Bartley 1934 – 2023

Partner of the late Howard Wilby; beloved cousin, friend and neighbour, David died peacefully at Boarbank Hall, 25 November.

David will be remembered in Grange for his quiet manner and professorial appearance.

David grew up in Cilcain, North Wales, an only child, but with an extended family and many friends providing lifelong support.

He graduated from Aberystwyth University with a Ph.D. and lectured in Botany and Ecology at Leeds University. The David Bartley Herbarium plant collection is held at the Natural History Museum. David was a highly respected colleague and researcher and an inspirational mentor and teacher. Many of his students corresponded with him to the end of his days. He principal research was in pollen. Pollen traps are all over Finland, courtesy of one his students now resident there. David's room at Boarbank was decorated with cards from well-wishers, many of them scenes or lovely artwork from Finland. David's other interests included gardening and music and, after Howard's death in 2015, he attended concerts in Preston and Manchester with others from Grange.

A kind and courteous neighbour; a true friend. Much missed.
