It is getting towards that time of year once more when we should review our 'end of tax year checklist', the tax breaks on offer to each of us are often left unused and therefore lost.

There are many tax allowances available but a few of the main ones to consider are as follows:

ISA allowance: £20,000

Capital Gains Tax allowance: £6,000 for an

individual (this will reduce to £3,000 from the 6th April 2024)

Personal Savings Allowance: £1,000 for basic

rate taxpayers and £500 for higher rate

taxpayers.

Dividend allowance: £1,000 (this will

reduce to £500 from the 6th April 2024)

Pension Annual Allowance: £60,000

There are many other tax allowances available and an investment should never be made simply based on tax savings. Cartmel Village Society Lecture on Saturday, March 2nd Royal Coats of Arms and Funeral Hatchments in Cartmel Priory

The Cartmel Village Society Annual Lecture will be held in Cartmel Priory on Saturday, March 2nd at 7pm. The Guest speaker will be Francis Downing, a renowned art restorer, who will talk about the Royal Coats of Arms and Funeral Hatchments in Cartmel Priory and other historic churches. The talk is free but places need to be booked in advance (please see details below).

As part of Cartmel village and the Priory's celebration of the Coronation of King Charles III it was decided to restore the 1681 Royal Coat of Arms of King Charles II which hangs in the Priory. Francis Downing was selected due to his extensive experience on similar projects around the United Kingdom and overseas. The restoration was carried out in the Priory during September 2023.

Royal Coats of Arms have been a common feature in

English churches since Henry VIII's Reformation in 1535, establishing the monarch as head of the Church of England. The earliest COAs were destroyed during Oliver Cromwell's Commonwealth but new ones were installed on the Restoration of King Charles II as Monarch in 1660. Cartmel Priory's COA is one of the earliest in existence and other local churches at Witherslack, Cartmel Fell and Helsington have interesting later examples. Cartmel Priory also has a fine set of funeral hatchments for the Lowther and Cavendish families dating from the early 18th and 19th centuries.

The lecture will be held in Cartmel Priory on Saturday, March 2nd starting at 7pm with light refreshments afterwards. Entry is free but places must be pre-booked and will be allocated on a first-come basis. Please apply to Ewen Cameron at e.cameron1@btinternet.com or on 07929 833528.

Surrogacy laws in England and Wales.

A recent report by the Law Commission (of England and Wales, and the Scottish Law Commission) have suggested that the current law governing surrogacy needs updating.

Most of the legislation dates from the 1980's and 1990's and hasn't kept up to date.

The report suggests a new system of a 'new pathway' which would come into force. This would start preconception of the child and would involve rigorous screening and safeguarding. If the right conditions are in place, it would enable the intended parents to become the legal parents of the child from birth, subject to the surrogates right to withdraw her consent.

The USA has various laws which differ from state to state, and we will all be familiar with celebrities, such as Kim Kardashian and Kanye West who have used 'gestational carriers' but the system in the UK will not be like that and it will not be monetary based. Most surrogates in the UK agree to do this, out of love, i.e. a sister having a baby for a sister who cannot, or friends to gay parents who would like a child.

There would be important protections and checks and the report states it aims to incentivise intended parents who are considering surrogacy to enter an arrangement here in the UK without having to go abroad.

Dealing with scammers

I bought a car costing £3,325 via an online marketplace.

I hadn't seen any negative reviews about the company so I just thought it was fine and transferred the money. But the car never arrived, and then I saw it re-advertised in different places. I tried to contact the company but they've changed all their numbers and email addresses. What can I do?

Anyone can be targeted by a scam and sadly anyone can fall for one. Talk to your bank or card company immediately to see if you can stop or recover the payment. Report the scam to Action Fraud on 0300 123 204. You can also contact the Citizens Advice Consumer Service for help with what to do next.

Citizens Advice Consumer Service received over 9,000 reports of scams between January to April 2023. The charity is urging more people to report scams to help protect others from falling victim. As scammers get ever more sophisticated it's more important than ever that we all work together to raise awareness, report scams and share our experiences to help protect ourselves from their tricks.

The most common scams faced by the public so far this year are malicious parcel delivery messages with scammers attempting to get hold of personal information or bank details. Several of the most frequently encountered forms of scams involve quite sophisticated impersonation



of official organisations.

It is important to keep alert to signs of a scam. These include offers that seem too good to be true. like a holiday that's much cheaper than you'd expect, or pressure to send money quickly, or in an unusual way - like by an iTunes voucher or a transfer service. Other clues are if you are asked to give away personal information such as passwords, PINs or verification codes - a reputable organisation will never ask for these things. Always step back and double check. If there is any hint that the organisation or person you are dealing with isn't genuine, such as a suspicious email address, don't part with any money or information.

Walk of the Month

With Grange Ramblers



A walk taking in field paths, tracks and bridleways, with extensive views of the Troutbeck valley, Lake Windermere and the surrounding high fells.

DISTANCE: 8.5 miles DIFFICULTY: Moderate, ascent 900 feet

TIME (INC BREAKS): 3.5 hours


Start at the junction of Moor Howe Road and Dubbs Road. Map ref: NY423006 (OS Explorer OL7)

- 1. Head north up the good track of Dubbs Road. Pass Dubbs reservoir.
- 2. Where the road changes to Garburn Road do a sharp U-turn left downhill towards the Troutbeck Valley.
- 3. On reaching the tree line turn sharp right, through a gate.
- 4. Follow the track above Limefitt Holiday Park. Continue north along the valley.
- 5. Looking down on Hagg Gill (to the left), watch for a footbridge. Turn sharp left to go over the bridge. On reaching a cart track turn left to Troutbeck Park.
- 6. Walk through the farm yard, turn left between the buildings and left again in front of the house to leave by the driveway. Continue along the quiet lane.
- 7. Take a left fork onto a footpath to walk along the valley below the hamlet of Town Head.

- 8. At the end of the path cross the road into the track straight ahead.
- 9. Take the footpath on the left (sp The Church)
- 10. At Troutbeck Church turn right along the A592.
- 11. Turn left up a track (sp The Howe). Pass the buildings.
- 12. As the track ascends turn right, through a gate, onto a footpath. Go through the fields to Longmire Road and turn right.
- 13. At the end turn left onto the road and continue back to the start point.

NOTE: This walk can be shortened to 5 miles by starting from Troutbeck Church. Walk north up the A592 to Limefitt Holiday Park. Follow the road through the park to turn left onto the path at point 4. Then follow the directions to point 10. The walk could also be lengthened by turning right at point 13 and heading to Orrest Head, before returning through field paths to the start point.

Grange and District Natural History Society

Members' Evening
In a packed meeting hall
our Chair, Peter Woodhead
introduced a series of short
talks by members.

Sue King updated us about the Curlew Recovery Project in the Lyth valley. 60 volunteers are liaising with farmers to maintain survival of lowland curlews, to try to improve their breeding success. In 2023 18 nests were discovered. 8 were predated; by crows, sheep, foxes and badgers. 49 eggs were laid, 25 chicks hatched, but only 4 fledged, 3 more than last year. They hope to get some volunteers to help next year.

Martin Chadwick told us about the Small Eggar Moth (its Latin name means Woolly Belly). 70 years ago this moth was very common, but now is rare, perhaps because the caterpillars prefer untrimmed hedges. Their presence is deduced by the webs spun by caterpillars. 30 webs were reported in Cumbria this year, centred on Allithwaite. Martin asks if anyone sees the webs to note the grid reference and take a photo. The only other colonies are in North Yorkshire and South Devon.

A refreshment break allowed members time to chat and look at the displays of fungi, birds' skulls and rocks. Sylvia Woodhead gave a review of the many activities of the Society in 2023. David Benham ended proceedings with his usual excellent photos of his most interesting finds, from parasitic Toothwort, Split Gill fungus on silage bales, ending with a False Widow Spider on his carpet at home which had given him a painful bite on his heel. Cumbria certainly has some interesting wildlife. The programme for 2024 is on the web site.

VEGETABLE BROTH INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp Eden Yard rapeseed oil
- 1 medium organic onion, chopped
- 1 small organic leek, cleaned and sliced
- 150g organic carrots, cut into small
- 125g organic swede, thickly peeled and cut into small cubes
- 250 g Suma organic broth mix* - soaking overnight reduces the cooking time. With no pre-soak rinse the broth mix, cover with cold water, bring to the boil, reduce heat and simmer gently for about 1/2 hour then follow the method
- 100g Great Scot Dried Green Lentils, rinsed
- Few sprigs of thyme
- 1.2 litres vegetable stock (made with 2 low-salt stock cubes)
- 200g organic curly kale or green veg

We're advocates of seasonal eating and organic farming here at Low Sizergh Barn. So, our shelves are currently filled with vegetables without the hothouse production, air freight and excess packaging.

It's a selection that is filling and nutritious, warming, and delicious. Let's hear it for the swedes and carrots, leeks, and onions, and, oh go on...sprouts and Jerusalem artichokes.

This month's recipe is humble and hearty, tasty and filling. And front and centre of its simple ingredients list is a good selection of organic vegetables.

METHOD

1/ Cover the broth mix (red lentils, green split peas, yellow split peas, pearl barley, and barley flakes with cold water and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer gently for about 1 hour or until all the liquid has been absorbed and the broth mix is tender.

2/ Heat the oil in a large pan and cook the onion and leek over a medium heat for about 5 minutes or until soft, stirring frequently.

3/ Add the carrots and swede and cook for 5 minutes.

4/ Stir in the broth, thyme and stock and bring to a fast boil for 5 minutes. Cover the pan, reduce the heat and simmer gently for 35 minutes. Add more stock or water if necessary. Add the kale and cook for a further 5-10 minutes.

5/ Serve with crusty bread.

HOW TO DRIVE SAFELY IN SNOW AND ICE

ALLITHWAITE QUARRY

Residents will be aware that Allithwaite Quarry has been closed to the public for some time. Having completed works recommended to the PC the area is now again open to the public. Work in removing fallen trees, replacing boundary fencing and new safety signage is complete, much rubbish has been removed in skips and this will be a continual process by volunteers as required.

Visitors are advised not to ignore the warnings on the new safety signage for their own safety, it should be remembered that the area is an unsupervised site and although the area is a tranquil, secluded area rich in wildlife, flora and fauna it is an ex industrial site which should be approached as such. Work will continue on the quarry as per the ten year ecology plan which is available on the Parish Council website along with a general risk assessment.

Please enjoy this quiet tranquil site which can be enjoyed by most but please be aware of the limitations the site may have and your own safety over the rough and uneven ground.

KEEP WARM, KEEP WELL

Cold weather can be seriously bad for your health. That's why it's important to look after yourself, especially during the winter. If you start to feel unwell, even if it's a cough or a cold, don't wait until it gets more serious. Seek advice from your pharmacist.

INCONSIDERATE CAR PARKING

Once again residents have contacted councillors about irresponsible parking. The Parish Council would ask motorists to be aware of where they are parking and not to park across dropped kerbs which are there to enable people with restricted mobility, and children in pushchairs, to get around.

Parking at road junctions and corners obstructs viewing for both motorists and pedestrians causing potential major road hazards. The Police and County Council Traffic enforcement are aware of these problems. Please use a little common sense and park with a thought for other road users and pedestrians. A reminder, from 11th December 2023, a new motoring law in the UK empowers authorities to issue £100 fines, or remove vehicles, for pavement parking violations.


"A riveting, remarkable hour of theatre"



This is a National Park not a Theme Park

While this article is not in our immediate area, we thought readers might be interested. It forms part of a wider debate about the balance between tourism and the maintaining of the original character of a place.

In our own area there is the potential for a pedestrian and cycle crossing of the viaduct, a possible lido restoration and the Morecambe Bay cycle way. I would suggest it's all a matter of balance and compromise. Some developments will enhance an area while some will detract, but the debate is interesting. The Lake District is well frequented by many of our readers so if it is of interest, please have a read.

Landscape charity Friends of the Lake District today announced that it will continue to oppose plans for a major visitor attraction at Elterwater Quarry, despite the changes the developer has made to the proposal. Plans for the 'cavern explorer' rope course and zip wires were re-submitted immediately before Christmas, after the initial proposal was rejected by the planning committee.

Quarry owners Burlington Slate Ltd are working with Zip World, who operate 23 zipwire courses across the UK, to develop the adventure attraction. There has been widespread opposition to the plan, including from ICOMOS (the International Council on Monuments and Sites), who are concerned that the proposal will damage aspects of the Lake District which underpin its status as a World Heritage Site. They've previously

said the development is "...of a type that would transform the quarry or part of it into a theme park and would trivialise the experience of an important aspect of the Lake District's heritage".

90,000 people signed a petition against the pre-application proposal, which also included a 'cavern coaster'. The proposal was refused by the planning committee largely due to the inadequacy of the travel plan (which describes how visitors are intended to get to the attraction). Friends of the Lake District's position is that there is no justification for the adventure attraction, and that the new version of the proposal will still result in significant extra traffic through the already highly congested village of Elterwater.



With another zipwire proposal also reemerging at Honister slate mine, these applications raise further questions about what sort of visitor attractions are appropriate for the Lake District. Friends of the Lake District says many of its members feel that 'theme park' type plans are exploiting the area, rather than enhancing it or complementing its special qualities.

It's thought that the revised Elterwater application will be considered at planning committee in March at the earliest. Friends of the Lake District says there's growing local anger at the proposal and they're urging people to submit their own response as soon as possible, using a special web page the charity has created. They're also planning an event in the area ahead of the committee meeting.



Precept for 2024-25 Agreed

Modest increase in budget for Town Council

At the Council's meeting on Monday 8 January, Grange Town Councillors voted to approve the budget and associated precept demand for 2024-25.

The precept demand goes to the billing authority, which then collects the tax for the Town Council.

Our billing authority has been South Lakeland District Council (SLDC), this changed to Westmorland and Furness Council (WFC) on 1 April 2023.

The precept is converted into amounts for each different Council Tax band which is added onto residents' Council Tax bills, along with charges levied on behalf of the Westmorland and Furness Council, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Cumbria Police and the Cumbria Fire and Rescue Authority.

A precept of £235,114 has been agreed for Grange Town Council, which represents an increase of £21,374 compared to last year.

This amount comes to the Town Council.

For Grange residents, there is also a charge from Westmorland and Furness Unitary Council for street lighting, which is added to the Town Council's section of the bill. This doesn't come to the Town Council. Westmorland and Furness Council retain it.

The Town Council's budget includes services such as running the Victoria Hall, the three blocks of public lavatories, Christmas lights, the Recreation Ground on the Prom, two allotment sites, the War Memorial with surrounds and the Lengthsman's services taking care of the town.

Grange Town Council is unusual in continuing to provide three blocks of public lavatories. Most local authorities now run no public loos at all. Maintenance and running costs are anticipated to rise this year. Councillors have tried to keep increases as low as possible for a number of years but eventually the rising cost of pretty much everything catches up with even councils in the end.

The Town Council offers grants to community groups via the Bay Villa Trust, a fund totally independent of the Council Tax precept.

At the end of the next financial year, the Town Council will lose the Council Tax Grant from Westmorland and Furness Unitary Council, a sum of £7,850, which has been paid to Grange historically by SLDC and more recently, WFC, in addition to the precept, to help maintain the town. This forthcoming loss has been taken into account in setting the precept figure, with a view to providing something of a cushion to ease the pain later.

Although fuel costs eased earlier in this financial year, of late they have started to rise again, with no real prospect of returning to previous levels. Another factor to be taken into account.

Despite the slight increase in its precept demand, the Chairman of the Council, Councillor Roger Handley says "GTC is well aware of the financial stresses on households in the current climate but, as usual, is faced with the difficult balancing act between keeping the Town running as usual and keeping the precept to a minimum. I do hope we are achieving that goal".



Farewell to a Village Character

Residents of Cartmel village and the local area said a sad farewell, at a funeral in the Priory Church, to Frances Jarvis, an ex-resident who had died at the age of 96. Known as Violet in her earlier years, she had been born in Egypt in 1927 and grew up there before and during the War, and spent much of her life living and working in other exotic countries before settling in Cartmel in the early 1990s.

She attended school in Egypt and returned to England after the war to train as a radiographer. After 3 years in Kent, she moved and worked overseas for almost 40 years. These places included Malaya, Kuwait (where she took up desert rallying and met Peter Jarvis who she married in 1962), the Seychelles, (where she set

up a photography business and was national Girl Guide Commissioner), and Libya. She and Peter settled in Cartmel in the early 1990s. Though well past retirement age, Frances started a salad sprout business in Cartmel, threw herself into many local clubs and activities. She supported Cartmel Priory working several hours a week in the shop, helped with fundraising for the Brook Animal charity at Cartmel races and local fairs, and provided respite for local carers by sitting with their housebound relatives to allow them to get out for a break. Into her nineties, Frances was a common sight (and astounded visitors) travelling around the village on her Segway. She remained fiercely independent but circumstances eventually forced her to move in 2022 to live with her daughter in Buckinghamshire, where she died peacefully last December. She had requested that her funeral be held in the Priory so that she could be buried in Cartmel graveyard, alongside Peter who had died in 1997.


