As the population gets older, we are seeing an increasing demand for suitable 'later living' housing. There are some impressive providers, creating a sense of community and keeping later generations well-integrated into society. Retirement housing is usually aimed at those over 55 or 60. Most retirement housing is sold on a leasehold basis and most new-build retirement properties come with a 999-year lease.

Obtaining specialist legal advice when buying a retirement property is essential.

Service charges

Typically, the service charge associated with retirement living can be substantially higher than that of a nonretirement lease. This is owing to the facilities available in retirement homes such as beautifully manicured gardens. It is important to understand the level of service charge you will be facing and how this can be increased. The lease should be carefully examined to understand what the landlord must provide against what they choose to provide.

Event Fees

This is a fee payable under a lease on certain events such as the re-sale or subletting of the property (also known as exit fees, transfer fees, deferred management fees and contingency fees).

Why? - to contribute towards sinking funds for major works and to cover the higher cost of providing specialist facilities. This is to maintain affordable service charges. Lack of transparency and understanding can be at ool an issue here if you are not fully advised on how these fees will operate. Upfront information should be provided and your legal advisor must fully explain to you what these are and when they will be payable (as this may not be just on a re-sale). For new homes, this must now also be declared at the reservation stage.

Regulation - the Law Commission has published a draft code to regulate these charges and to protect leaseholders from unfair or hidden fees. To date, the Government has committed to approving the code but has yet to do so.

Age Restrictions - most retirement housing will have an age restriction, typically 55. This is also often imposed as a planning condition from when the complex was first developed and there will be an assignment provision within the lease to comply with. Typically, the prior consent of the landlord will be required.

Investment Matters

Making pension contributions are not only a way to help save towards your retirement, they can be an extremely tax efficient investment and even a useful tool when considering inheritance tax planning. Depending on your income tax rate at the time, contributions can attract tax relief of up to 45%.

In the past there has been an upper limit on the amount you can build up in a pension over your lifetime and still receive this tax relief on your contributions, this is known as the lifetime allowance (LTA). This was last set at £1,073,100 and while most people may never reach this amount, the LTA was abolished in the governments spring budget of 2023.

While someone who does reach this figure can now continue to top up their pension and receive tax relief there are still some limitations in place. Most people can choose to take 25% of their pension pot as a tax-free lump sum, but if your pension has exceeded £1,073,100 then the maximum you can take is still 25% of this figure, so a maximum tax-free lump sum of £268,275.

This is just one example of how changes made by the government can affect your financial plans. There are at least two budgets a year and a change in government

could lead to further changes to the way we are taxed. Seeking professional advice which is tailored to your individual needs and can be adjusted when changes do occur allows you to focus on the things that are important to you.

Lake Annecy Solution to solve the issues of Lake Windermere's water quality

This information was published by Windermere and Bowness Town Council by the admin on their facebook page on 6th February.

We have asked them for permission to publish and it appears below unedited. Grange Now takes no responsibility for the accuracy of this article but it is directly relevant to Grange Now readership area and so we are publishing it in the interests of our readers' information. Please note that it is just a feasibility study, not an agreed plan.

Here are additional details of the proposed scheme, along with maps detailing the possible route of the pipes. These have been provided by United Utilities:

Feasibility Review Summary:

Between July and December 2023, a team of 15 engineers, from multiple disciplines, conducted a high-level feasibility assessment to understand how all discharges within the Windermere catchment could be diverted and taken to a notional treatment facility at Grange Over Sands. The review has accounted for known factors, such as topography and areas of ecological importance -



to develop a detailed proposal for a scheme of this magnitude would require further detailed investigation, however the assessment undertaken to date has demonstrated what a theoretical view could entail, summarised as follows:

· In total, 247 miles of new network would be required throughout the catchment to remove all discharges, this consists of:

o A 42 mile long 'ring main' style network, linked around Windermere from Grasmere to Newby Bridge - then flowing to Grange Over Sands, with a theorised view that treated flows will be returned to the environment in Morecambe Bay, via a long-sea outfall pipe. This section of network would look to intercept the main public network and significant foul water systems.

Using a case study from the village of

Rydal, estimates have been applied across the catchment to understand the potential scale of infrastructure to connect individual septic tanks to the new network. This study estimated that a further 205 miles of network would be required to provide connections to individual properties. The proposed route has been considered with several principles including minimising the

total sewer length, minimising impact on communities, businesses and tourism, and avoiding areas of environmental, ecological and archaeological importance.

Estimates for the scheme have been produced using methodologies aligned with guidance and recommendations of the Infrastructure Projects Authority (IPA) and Association for the Advancement of Cost Engineering (ACCE). Given the scale of the proposed solution and comparative timescales to complete the review, the solution developed can only be considered conceptual and therefore subject to very high estimating tolerances, i.e. an 'order of magnitude' estimate. To remove all discharges from the catchment has been estimated between £3.5bn and £6.4bn.

Nacreous clouds seen from **Kents Bank Road**

The images were taken on the first day [2023 Dec. 21st, but nacreous cloud re-occurred on a few more mornings - until the last sighting 9th January this year.

Sometimes called 'Rainbow Clouds", the colour spectrum is clearly evident in the close-up picture.

Information on the internet states the phenomena are "very rare" and are seen "before dawn". It was actually visible from dawn, but only when looking more or less towards the sun which was mostly hidden

by the closer black clouds. On the 21st December, it continued for nearly two hours and was changing all the time.

The cloud particles temperature has to be, at the most, minus 85 deg. C

They can only be seen when looking roughly towards the affected area of sky, so it would be dangerous to use binoculars or telescope if you accidentally caught the nearby sun in the lens.

Community Orchard: South Lakes Orchard Group annual visit

Grange Community
Orchard was planted by
Grange Civic Society in
1998 on land at Yewbarrow
left to the people of Grange
by Colonel Porritt, the last
owner of Yewbarrow Hall.

The aim was to create a collection of different varieties of fruit trees, including some of local origin. The orchard now contains over 50 fruit trees. All are labelled giving the origin, the date when it was introduced, the type (cooker, dessert or dual) and when it is ready for picking.

The group, known as SLOG, met in the Grange Community Orchard on Saturday 27th January for their Winter Pruning Workshop. It was a fine afternoon and a great turnout of around 30 members and others for Andy Gilchrist and Dick Palmer from SLOG to discuss winter pruning theory and demonstrate techniques. They talked about how each tree should be assessed for Diseased, Damaged or Dead (DDD) wood and removed. This type of pruning is important for the health and maintenance of bush grown

apple trees in particular, if they are to retain their shape and reach their full fruiting potential. Other types of pruning were discussed, such as summer pruning to remove vigorous vegetative growth and restorative pruning for old and neglected trees. Cordon, Stepover and Espalier grown trees were mentioned as ways of growing fruit in more confined spaces. Andy demonstrated how to stress a healthy, ten-year-old tree, Bradley's Beauty which has never fruited in the orchard.

Before going home to prune their own trees, secateurs and loppers were available for everyone to practise winter pruning for themselves; shortening new growth to help stimulate trees into producing fruiting spurs for next year. This will keep the community orchard fruit trees in good shape and fruiting well.

The civic society will now be employing David Rhodes to complete the pruning of the orchard as he does every year when the workshop is over.

Walk of the Month

With Grange Ramblers



A walk along the coast to Silverdale and Jenny Brown's Point, returning through fields and woods to Arnside Tower.

DISTANCE: 8 miles DIFFICULTY: Moderate, with 500ft ascent

TIME (INC BREAKS): 4.5 Hours

Start: Roadside parking on road from Arnside to Arnside Tower. Map ref **SD458774 (0S Explorer OL7)**

1/ Enter woods via gate opposite parking area. Turn right along path.

2/ At a wall, turn left uphill. Take left fork (sp The Knott)

3/ Over The Knott. Take a path to the left downhill. At end turn right.

4/ After a gate turn left (sp Far Arnside)

5/ Continue along driveway to road. Turn right, then left through a gate.

6/ Down slope to a gate, turn right and follow the fence-line.

7/ Turn left along road. Continue along the road, into Lancashire, and turn right down a lane (sp The Cove)

8/ At the coast turn left. Follow the path through fields to Silverdale.

9/ At the road turn right. Left at the next junction. Continue to Gibraltar Farm.

10/ Take lane on right. Then a gate on

the right onto Jack Scout. After passing the Limekiln, keep right along the cliff top path to Jenny Brown's Point.

11/ Through a stile onto the road and turn right. Pass a row of cottages and take the path along the foreshore.

12/ At a crossroads in the paths, turn left and climb uphill. Follow the well-marked path to a road.

13/ Turn right, then left. (sp The Green). Take right fork in path, above the cliffs, through woods.

14/ At road turn right, then left (sp St John's church). Keep left after red brick building. Into a field and follow wall on left. At end continue straight ahead.

15/ Turn right along road. Left onto path (sp Cove Road). At end turn right along road. Left up Elmslack Lane. At end, bear left and continue onto path around King William's Hill. (sp Arnside Tower)

16/ Walk through caravan site along path to Arnside Tower. Bear left of tower and

Such birds were not seen on the 'pop-up' high-tide bird watch from Grange Promenade organised by Martin Chadwick. Highlights included black-backed gulls swooping down to catch water voles, a water rail flying between bird watchers to get out of the water, and over 50 snipe on the reed patch known as 'Snipe Island'.

COWBOY BANGERS AND BEANS

INGREDIENTS

- 1tbsp olive oil or vegetable oil
- 6 butcher's sausages
- 1 large or 2 medium onions, sliced
- 1 medium-hot chilli, chopped and deseeded
- 1 large or 2 medium carrots, chunkily chopped on the diagonal
- 3 celery sticks, chunkily chopped
- 250g squash, peeled, deseeded and chunkily chopped
- 700g passata
- 2 tbsp English mustard
- 1 tbsp soft dark brown sugar
- 1 tbsp cocoa
- 2 tsp smoked paprika
- 1 garlic bulb, halved through the equator
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 sprig of thyme (optional)
- 2 x 400g tins of beans (borlotti, kidney or butter), drained
- Sea salt and black pepper


We root for organic and seasonal veg and you'll find lots of choices on our farm shop shelves. Alongside some citrus flavour and colour from farther afield, Harlequin winter squash is ready to be used in any recipe calling for a versatile vegetable.

Harlequin will go down particularly well in Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall's cowboy bangers and beans. This recipe is from his newest book. River Cottage Comfort Food: Best Loved Favourites Made Better for You.

METHOD

1/ Heat the oil in a large and flameproof casserole dish over medium heat. Add the sausages and cook for 5-10 minutes to get some colour and firmness. Snip each sausage into 3 or 4 pieces and return to the casserole dish.

2/ Add the onion, chilli, carrot, celery, and squash. Cook



3/ Add the passata, mustard, brown sugar, cocoa, paprika, bay, thyme if using, seasoning, and tinned beans. Pour on enough water to cover everything and bring to a simmer.

4/ Reduce the heat, cover, and cook for 30-40 minutes or until all the veg is tender.

5/ Taste and add more salt and pepper if needed. Then serve.





Sankey postcards offer snapshot of a bygone era

1818 Auctioneers' Specialist Valuer, Andy Bowden talks about a very special collection that's going under the hammer as we go to print.

"As an auction house on the border of Cumbria and Lancashire, we're well placed to sell one of the largest collections of Cumbrian postcards. The collection is a lifetime of work by its owner, and the postcards are organised into specific towns and areas as well as by postcard manufacturers.

"One of those manufacturers is Sankey. Edward Sankey was a well-known local photographer in Barrow-in-Furness for many years, and later in Cumbria and the Northwest. Edward was a keen businessman and in 1923 he gained a patent for his specially designed printing machine. It allowed the Sankey family to print more postcards with greater speed, and to produce smaller runs of cards for other publishers.

"The Sankey family also owned a car. Thanks to this, they had greater access to the Lake District and surrounding areas. They went on to make a 'Tour of Lakeland' series, which was novel at the time and popular with tourists and visitors to the region.

"Over the past few years, there has been a major project to catalogue Sankey's work, which is now stored in the Cumbria Archives. We believe the first Sankey cards started appearing around 1902; they are now highly sought after by local history enthusiasts, collectors, and researchers.

"That's because postcards are so much more than just images. They serve as snapshots of a bygone era, capturing the essence of a time and place. This impressive and extensive collection of over 9,500 postcards provides a valuable insight into social history and life in Cumbria from the early 1900s onwards.

"We feel very lucky to have handled this collection. It's the largest private collection of postcards that we have ever seen and it's sure to attract worldwide interest to our county."

The Sankey cards within the wider collection are valued at £2,500.


Cartmel CE Primary School launches playground project



SOUTH LAKELAND STITCHERS GROUP

Following our stitching session in December, making our Kawandi placemats, using straight stitch or Kantha stitch and exploring all the different creative ways of stitching using Fly Stitch in January, we worked 'outside the box' in February and explored silk fibres. We participated in three workshops, each led by a member of our group. Layering very fine silk fibres over a small bowl and applying small amounts of silk glue, we gradually built up the base for a free standing decorative bowl. Natural and coloured fibres were used and once dry, embellishments and embroidery could be added. Using a similar technique of layering fibres and including dried petals and leaves, we made silk paper. This was rather a sticky process involving dollops of paste to adhere the fibres and flowers together. However, the results were very interesting and had to dry out fully before we could appreciate the samples. The final workshop involved using gummy silk, which is the first result once silk is unwound from the cocoon before cleaning. Fibres were layered over a leaf or wooden block print and when a hot iron was applied to the fibres under parchment paper, an imprint was left and the fibres were stuck together. These three techniques were new to many of us and samples of work can be viewed on southlakelandstitchers. blogspot.com
