



Most property in the country is now registered, but did you know that as much as 14% of the land in England and Wales is still currently unregistered?

Why would that worry anyone? Well firstly, selling or mortgaging is both simpler and guicker if the title is registered. Many buyers will actually insist that if your property is not already registered that you do so before they will go ahead. This can take months and delay or even scupper your sale altogether.

Fraud is another motivating factor, as registering in your name helps prevent fraudulent transactions such as someone attempting to sell the land from under you or mortgaging it without your knowledge or even to the prevent someone claiming title to some or all of your property by adverse possession (commonly known as squatter's rights).

The Land Registry also offer a monitoring service that will notify you if any activity occurs on your title, giving you the chance to check and prevent unwanted activity. In addition to which, once registered, the government guarantees your title.

In April a Cumbrian man is embarking on a walk of a lifetime tackling over 1000 miles from Lands End to John O'Groats. John Barrett of Allithwaite is able to undertake the epic challenge following surgery to treat glaucoma which has saved his sight and will be raising money for eyecare charity Sightsavers UK.

John said, "I'm lucky to live in a country with an amazing National Health Service so was able to benefit from treatment for glaucoma and cataracts meaning I am still able to see but all over the poorer parts of the world thousands of people lose their sight because of treatable conditions so Sightsavers was an obvious charity to support. They fund and support projects in Africa and across the world that deliver treatment to people who would otherwise face a life without sight."

Setting off from Lands End on 1 April John hopes to complete the route by the end of June. Following the South West Coast Path, Offa's Dyke Path and some of the Scottish long distance footpaths the route passes through some of the most stunning scenery in the country. "That being the case I will of course be walking through my own County, one of the most beautiful places in the UK, during May."

Investment Matters

The Spring Budget 2024 and the British ISA

Current Chancellor of the Exchequer Jeremy Hunt announced his spring budget on the 6th March 2024. There were far too many announcements made to cover in a short article but one that piqued my interest was the British ISA.

This is currently under consultation until June 2024 so not all of the details have been finalized but the key points are:

- A £5,000 increase in the current annual £20,000 ISA allowance specifically to be used for investing in British companies.
- Effectively increases your annual ISA allowance to £25,000 per annum.
- The £5,000 for the British ISA will need to be a Stocks and Shares/Investment ISA and will likely need to be held in a separate ISA to any existing investments you hold.

Anyone who currently maximizes their £20,000 annual ISA allowance and still has additional capital for investment will be able to utilize this additional allowance. This would allow a couple to potentially invest a combined total of £50,000 a year into the tax-efficient wrapper of an ISA.

As the British ISA will be an investment proposition focusing on one global region it will be important to review any existing investments held. While investing in British companies is an attractive idea for many people, making sure your portfolio remains diversified should also be a consideration. Once the British ISA launches later in the year this will be an opportune time to speak to your Financial Planner about the options available.

Grange Prom and Lido rejuvenation update



Grange's £6.8million Lido and Prom restoration project is on track to be completed this summer.

Work started in April last year. It will see the lido site open again with a temporary infill to the pool to create a new multiuse public space.

The project will hopefully protect the derelict Grade II-listed site's social and cultural heritage in a way which doesn't preclude the option of bringing the pool back into use sometime in the future by temporarily infilling the pool with material which is removable and suitable for future recycling.

Main contractors RH Irving Construction started work on site in May last year and since then the site has been cleared and demolition work carried out. Demolition works have started on the existing perimeter walls and retaining walls and timber boarding removed from the pavilion. Sea wall repairs have been carried out, as well as installation of the new drainage system and steps to the north and south buildings.

Extensive external and internal repairs and upgrading works are being carried out in all existing buildings,including concrete repairs and rebuilding work.

The temporary pool infill will soon be completed, along with foundations and brick work to retaining walls and boundary walls, removing internal walls in the pavilion and installing steelwork.

Scheduled work in March included replacement of existing concrete terraces; continued construction of boundary walls, ramps, footpaths and retaining walls; complete installation of new water main; preparatory work for new electrical supply; and starting drainage works to the pool, as well as specialist cleaning of existing parapet walls.

Works to the existing sea wall on the promenade are complete. It was cleaned, repaired and a protective coating applied. Resurfacing of promenade has started.

The work also includes connectivity works to link the promenade to the town; public realm furniture; signage; improvements to railings; and the new playground area.

Hopefully in the coming months, Grange Now will be able to report further updates on progress.

Ambulance Service finds a new home

Over a year ago, NWAS (North West Ambulance Service) put out an appeal to the Grange-over-Sands community to help them stay in the town.

Thanks to Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service (CFRS), they have moved down the road into the fire station on Kents Bank Road. NWAS was based at its small station on the same road for more than 20 years and when the current owners declared an interest in reclaiming the site for their own use – the hunt was on to find an alternative in the town.

NWAS Area Director for Cumbria and Lancashire, Matt Cooper comments: "There is a definite need for an ambulance based in Grange-over-Sands so we wanted to do everything we could to ensure we could stay. Unfortunately, suitable properties just weren't available so it is great news to now be able to confirm that we are now sharing accommodation with Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service. "We would like to thank the local community who were so helpful in suggesting new sites, our current site's owners R.A. and J.S. Fletcher and Sons who have looked after us for 20 years, and of course, Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service for opening up their station to us."

There is currently one 24/7 emergency ambulance in Grange-over-Sands which is operated by a team of eight clinicians. Refurbishment at the fire station will get underway soon to create a mess room, kitchen, bathroom, locker room and office area.

A canopy will be erected outside, and there will be parking for ambulances and staff parking. Once contractors are in place, it should take about two months to complete the works, after which NWAS will move from the current shared accommodation into its own space on the site. Initially, the agreement is for 12 months with the potential to make it a permanent arrangement.

Lasting Powers of Attorney – will I lose control and are they safe?

Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPAs) are legal documents by which an individual may appoint another person or persons (attorneys) to make decisions on their behalf. It is possible to appoint attorneys to make Health and Welfare decisions and/ or to make Property and Financial decisions. Drawing up an LPA while in good physical and mental health does not mean that an individual is giving up control of their financial affairs or health and welfare decisions. It is simply putting measures in place for the future in case they are needed.

It is possible to appoint one attorney or more than one, and to appoint replacement attorneys if an attorney is unable to act when the time comes. An LPA must be registered with the Office of the Public Guardian before it is valid and can be used.

A Property and Finance LPA can be used when the individual has lost mental capacity to manage his or her financial affairs but also if the individual has not lost capacity but there is a physical problem such as old age and frailty or the effects of suffering a stroke, for example. While an individual continues to have mental capacity to manage his or her own financial affairs, an attorney can only act with the individual's knowledge and approval. A Health and Welfare LPA cannot be used by the attorneys unless or until the individual has completely lost all ability to make any decisions about his or her health and welfare. It is possible for the individual to give his or her attorneys the power to make life sustaining treatment decisions.

The choice of attorney is very important. The attorneys should always be a person or people that the individual trusts implicitly such as family members or close friends. It is possible to choose a professional person to act as attorney, usually where there are no family members or close friends or there are safeguarding issues.

Although attorneys may be granted significant authority under LPAs, the Mental Capacity Act 2005 (MCA) imposes legal safeguards to protect the individual's interests. For example, it is an overriding legal requirement that the attorney always acts in the individual's best interests regardless of the best interest of anyone else. The attorney must always help an individual to make a decision rather than just making a decision without first establishing if the individual has a view or is capable of making the decision his or herself. The attorney has limited ability to use the individual's property to benefit anyone else other than for example, birthday or Christmas presents to close family members. An attorney cannot act under an LPA to change an individual's will. Unless specified in the LPA itself, attorneys are not allowed to pay themselves for what they do and are only entitled to out of pocket expenses.



Review of Sewage/Spill Problems PEOPLE POWER!

Introduction

For fifteen years, individual residents of Cark reported to United Utilities and the Environment Agency the sewage spills from the Cartmel in Cark Pumping Station into the River Eea, which flows through the village. No effective action was taken and residents were told "keep reporting any spills".

Setting up an Action Group

The residents started meeting informally to discuss how to get the sewage spills stopped.

It was discovered that United Utilities were discharging illegally into the river Eea, thereby breaking the terms of their Environmental Licence, which allows discharges under strictly controlled condition. The Environment Agency were contacted and advised of this and asked to act.

Concerns and Aims

1.Public Health

2.Protection of Wildlife and Habitat

3.Protection of the Beach on the Bay

4.Need for reliable, truthful reports from United Utilities and the Environment Agency on the working of the Pumping Station.

Action

Members attended a Parish Council meeting to ask for the support of the council, which was given.

Public Meeting

The local MP and Councillors and were invited to a public meeting in the Village Hall to discuss action to be taken regarding the sewage spills. Over 30 people attended and several people and the MP offered to help.

One resident produced an exceptional display of photographs showing the high level of sewage and sanitary items flowing past her back door every day.

The MP was very shocked to hear the high statistics of sewage being split and reported the situation in Parliament and Cark-in-Cartmel was specifically named as a shocking example of spillage of sewage into a river.

Media Input

As a result of the MP's report in Parliament, local radio, and TV contacted the group and arranged interviews for local news sections. The Times newspaper also cited Carkin-Cartmel as having a high level of spillages, as did other publications.

Parish Council

The Parish Council contacted Holker Estates, who have ensured that the use of temporary toilets on Race Days conforms with sewage dispersal rules and regulations.

The Environment Agency mounted an investigation and United Utilities came up with a Plan of Action.

United Utilities provide tankers to take away spillages caused by Cartmel Races or other events which use chemical toilets. Improvement work on the Pumping Station has begun.

The Future

Spillages will be monitored and reported on an ongoing basis.

Walk of the Month

With Grange Ramblers



Coffin Trail from White Moss Common to Rydal Hall and Rydal Water

DISTANCE: 6 miles DIFFICULTY: Moderate, with 600ft ascent TIME (INC BREAKS): 4 Hours

Start: on the minor road which turns right off the A591 at the Grasmere end of the White Moss carparks. Map reference NY348066 (0S Explorer OL7)

1/ Follow this minor road approximately 1/4 mile uphill to meet a T-junction with a right hand turn signed to the Coffin Route 2/ Turn right at this junction and follow the lane as it changes into a track and joins the stony Coffin Route and continue to reach Rydal Mount.

3/ On reaching the lane turn right to descend to the main road (A591). This lane passes the Rydal Hall entrance and you can if you wish detour left here to visit the café, waterfalls and gardens before continuing on the walk.

4/ On reaching the main road, turn left for a short way, then cross the road opposite the Badger Bar to take the signed footpath to cross the River Rothay then the left hand path up to reach houses at Cote How.

5/ Here turn right and follow the lane onto the upper track alongside Rydal Water which passes the Rydal Quarry caves.

6/ Soon after you have passed the caves there is a left hand fork, with a short stretch of fence, onto a minor path which leads onto Loughrigg Terrace.

7/ Keep left to follow Loughrigg Terrace until you reach the entrance to Deer Bolt wood on the right.


8/ Go through this gate on the right to enter the woods and descend towards Grasmere lake.

9/ As you reach a house, take the right hand turning to continue to descend onto the Grasmere lake shore.

10/ At the far end of this beach continue on the signed Riverside walk path.

Trees and Seas

Andrew Weatherall, Senior Policy Officer for the RSPB, gave a stimulating talk on Lake District Trees, Woods and Forests to a full audience of Grange Natural History Society in the URC Hall.

Andrew has a background in commercial forestry and is passionate about the temperate 'rain forests' of the Lake District. He grabbed our interest immediately with a pub-style quiz on percentages of woodland cover: the UK has only 13%, England & the Lake District 10%, yet woods contain 80% of terrestrial biodiversity. The UK imports 80% of its timber, so we need what Andrew termed 'climate-smart' forestry.

The Lake District's oldest woods, Keskadale and Birkrigg are high up in the Newlands valley. In 2020 a wildfire did not penetrate the wood to cause damage: native woodlands may be more resistant to wildfires. He concluded that Ancient Woodlands, defined as existing since 1600, need serious protection.

On International Women's Day, Georgia de Jong Cleyndert explained her role as Head of Marine Conservation for the NW Wildlife Trusts. She showed pictures of the abundant marine life in the 'blue-carbon habitats' of the Irish Sea, from the seashore: sea gooseberries, starfish, crabs, worms, sea urchins, to deeper water: rays, catfish, brittle stars, grey seals, dolphins, harbour porpoises and basking shark. Difficulties can arise, as the Irish Sea is bordered by 6 countries, all with different conservation policies, who manage their sections accordingly. The Irish Sea faces many development pressures, not least a planned fourfold increase in offshore wind turbines. Georgia explained the complex processes considered, to minimise the negative impacts, before these are constructed. The solid wind turbine bases

provide new reef habitats for marine life, and Kittiwakes had been found nesting on an electrical transmitter substation off Walney Island.

Georgia showed videos of the Marine Internship programme, including monitoring the amount of carbon stored in sea grass, and working with fishermen in a project to use creels to catch scampi, rather than by destructive bottom trawling. She concluded by emphasising the value of Citizen Science and urged people to get involved in their local coastline.

With organic raw milk on tap at the farm shop, and this month's recipe, it's a short and easy route from our cows to your table. Paneer is a fresh cheese often called for in Indian cuisine. Fresh matters, so there isn't really any point in buying it in a pack from a supermarket.

HOMEMADE PANEER

INGREDIENTS

- 5 litres organic raw milk
- 150ml organic lemon juice

METHOD

1/ Pour the milk into a saucepan and bring to 90 degrees, stirring occasionally. Remove the pan from the heat once at temperature and add the lemon juice.

2/ As the milk cools, it will begin to coagulate into small curds, which will sink to the bottom of the pan.3/ Line a sieve with a double layer of muslin and set

over a bowl. Scoop the curds into the sieve using a



spoon and leave for about 10 mins to allow the whey to drain through the cloth. Draw the muslin around the paneer and gently squeeze out any excess liquid.

4/ Transfer the cloth-wrapped cheese to a tray and pat it out into a 2cm-thick rectangle. Cover it with a heavy board or tins and leave it for 15 minutes.

5/ Remove the paneer from the muslin and immerse it in cold water for 30 minutes.6/ Take the paneer from the water and pat it dry with a clean tea towel. Store, wrapped, in the fridge for up to a week.

ALLITHWAITE-8 RUNNING RACE

Allithwaite Running Club is planning to hold a running race entitled the Allithwaite-8 again this year. The date of the race will be Saturday the 2nd of November, with a start time of 11:00. As in previous years, the race start/finish will be at Allithwaite community centre. The planned course is the same as used since 2017.

Most of the route is through the parishes of Allithwaite-&-Cartmel and Broughton East. It will pass through the parish areas of Lower Holker and Grange only briefly. We don't need any roads to be closed. Marshals from the club will be present at road junctions and where the route crosses roads.

They are limiting the number of runners to 140 this year. Car parking will be arranged on the driveway of St. Mary's church, Allithwaite and (subject to the ground being firm enough) on the upper, grassed area of Allithwaite playing fields next to the community centre / bowling club.

CARTMEL FISH SLABS AND PINNACLE

As part of the Grant Funded Restoration of the ancient Market Square Fish Slabs and Pinnacle there was a requirement to relocate the weathered and eroded pinnacle in Cartmel, for internal display. Due to the issue of long term stewardship, that has not proved possible. However, agreement has now been reached with the Primary School for the pinnacle to be displayed within a permanently paved area as part of proposals to redevelop the playground and surrounding environs to create a more environmentally friendly play area for pupils.

RESULT OF REFERENDUM – ALLITHWAITE AND CARTMEL NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN

A local referendum on the Allithwaite and Cartmel Neighbourhood Development Plan was held on the 29th February 2024 to decide whether the local community were in favour of the plan being used to help decide planning applications in the area.

The result was 259 in favour (83%) and 55 against (17%). The turnout of electors was 20.63 per cent.

In accordance with Section 38A (4) of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 (as amended), the Westmorland and Furness Council must now "make" the plan as more than half of those voting were in favour. The decision to "make" the plan will be made at a Cabinet meeting on 30th April 2024.

When approved, the plan will become formally adopted and have equivalent weight in decision making to the Local Plan as part of the Development Plan.

The plan was drawn up by Allithwaite and Cartmel Parish Council following consultation with local residents and businesses. The policies proposed in the plan include:

- · Ensuring high quality in new development;
- Conserving and enhancing the landscape character of the parish, including protection of significant views, and the Cartmel Conservation Area;
- Protecting local green space through the designation of eight local green spaces;
- Protecting and enhancing green infrastructure and biodiversity;
- Protecting dark skies to minimise light pollution.

Neighbourhood planning gives communities direct power to develop a shared vision for their neighbourhood and shape the development and growth of their local area. A neighbourhood plan ultimately forms part of the Development Plan – policies which local authorities use to determine planning applications.

Steady growth but realistic buyers

CARTMEL PENINSULA LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

CPI HS's March meetina welcomed Professor lan Hodkinson who talked about The Ague: The History of Malaria in Cumbria and the North. As a Professor Emeritus in the School of Biological and Environmental Sciences of Liverpool John Moore's University, Ian had developed an interest in the area around his home in Levens which had been swampland before being drained around 1800 as a result of the Enclosures Act. He explained how there were many historical references to the prevalence of the Ague, a sweating and shivering condition resulting from a form of malaria, in Čumbria and

the north of England. The marshy conditions had been a perfect habitat for mosquitos which carried and spread the disease and which had caused significant health problems for local residents. Ian described a number of dubious cures which had been employed but noted that the arrival of guinine was the first effective remedy. The draining of most of these bogs to improve agriculture during the Napoleonic Wars had eliminated the problem but he wondered whether environmental "re-wilding" proposals might result in similar problems in the future. The club's next meeting will be on Thursday, April 4th when Diana Matthews will talk about Lake Shore Villas of Windermere. Entry is free for members and £3 for visitors. CVS held its well-attended Annual Lecture in the Priory with guest speaker Francis Downing, a renowned art conservator. who talked about his recent work on the Priory's Royal Coat of Arms. Ewen Cameron gave a brief introduction on how the CVS had decided to restore the Priory's King Charles II 1681 CoA to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III. Francis started by giving a fascinating and detailed explanation of the challenges faced in restoring artwork, and the skilful techniques used to conserve them. He described the work that had been required on the Priory's CoA and concluded by looking at historical Funeral Hatchments, where the coats of arms of important people who had died used to be hung for a period of mourning on their residences before being displayed permanently in their local church. He covered Cartmel Priorv's five such examples for the Lowther and Cavendish families dating from the 18th and 19th centuries. The free event concluded with light refreshments and the opportunity to examine the restored CoA. This lecture had been delayed from last December to fit in with Francis' availability and the CVS is currently considering a suitable subject and speaker for the next lecture in December 2024.
