"As someone in my mid-twenties, I had never considered putting a Will in place until I joined our Private Client team here at Gedye & Sons. However, our twenties and thirties can be full of significant life milestones such as buying your first home, investing in a pension, and having children. A Will is something that we should all be thinking about regardless of our age."

Who will inherit my estate when I die?

When you pass away, everything you own is referred to as your Estate and a Will dictates how you wish for your Estate to be dealt with after your death. Putting a Will in place is the only way to guarantee that what you want to happen actually does happen.

What does an Executor do?

In a Will you appoint Executors. An Executor is a person (or persons as you may have more than one) who is responsible for administering your Estate and carrying out the wishes in your Will. They may need to apply for Probate too. Being an Executor is not always an easy task so you should think carefully about who you would like to appoint to be your Executor. Having a Will, and being able to appoint Executors of your choosing, will give you the freedom to pick the people who you think will do the job best and, perhaps even more importantly, ensure that they are people that you trust. It is important that you tell the person whom you have chosen to be Executor so that they are aware of their role and responsibilities.

Does it matter whether I'm married?

Unfortunately, the Rules of Intestacy do not recognise unmarried partners or cohabiting partners and as such, unmarried couples will not inherit their partner's assets. This means that you could be in a relationship with someone for several years and even share a house and children, but this does not entitle them to receive anything from your Estate when you die. If you wanted to leave anything to your partner, then it is crucial that you make a Will and include them as a beneficiary, to make sure that they are appropriately provided for once you have gone.

Future-proof your Will

It is recommended that you review and possibly update your Will every three to five years and also whenever your circumstances change. Sometimes young people can be put off making a Will as they are planning to have more children and think they would not be included in the Will. However, with the right wording, it is possible to future proof your Will and leave your Estate to future children and grandchildren including any unborn children.

Bandstand at Grange-over-Sands



In the last edition of Grange Now, in the Mayor's Report, Roger Handley said he had opened this year's Band Concerts in Park Road Gardens.

He could not find out when concerts had started and asked for anyone with information to let him know.

Using information from Nick Thorne's website

grangeoversandshistory.weebly.com supplemented by my own research using digitised local newspaper reports and census returns I can report that I have found answers to Roger's question.

Originally the bandstand was erected on the Promenade and the first concert was held on Easter Monday. 24 April 1905 by Grange Brass Band with help from some players from Barrow. J Gardner was the bandmaster and the Westmorland Gazette on 29 April reported that the crowd that assembled was one of the largest ever seen in Grange. Ye Olde Teahouse adjacent had opened the Monday before (17 April) and about 300 free teas were served to locals by Mrs Entwistle of the Mikado Tea Rooms who had rented the building. This celebration was the official opening of the Promenade and 2 large commemoration cakes were provided. However, there were complaints by the ladies about sooty deposits from the passing trains marking their dresses but it was not until 1929 that the Bandstand was moved to Park Road Gardens on the other side of the railway. The Council had purchased a former market garden from Rev James Park in 1926 to create a garden for the Bandstand. On 6 April 1929 Besses o' th' Barn Band from Bury, one of the oldest and most famous brass bands, played at the opening of the Park. This was the weekend after the Easter weekend, Easter Sunday was 31 March. The Bandstand was surrounded by a small moat and seating surrounded it.

The Tearoom and Bandstand were provided and paid for by Harold Porritt JP director of a textile factory in Helmshore who came to live in Grange in 1895. The 1901 census record him living at Netherwood, Rockland Road, Grange-over-Sands. He was elected onto the Town Council and became chairman.



He was a very benevolent benefactor and amongst his gifts to the town he paid for improving a piece of land on the Promenade that the Council developed over a new sewer system as well as providing the tearoom with an elegant bandstand adjacent on the improved land. He also paid for fitting out the tearoom. Pat Rowland

Pension tax relief... Are you getting it all?

Pensions are great long term savings plans, as under current legislation they are afforded some of the most preferential tax treatments available to savers. Arguably the biggest being tax relief on the money you pay in. Most people saving towards their retirement will receive basic rate tax relief at a rate of 20% on any contributions they make, so if you wanted to save a £1,000 into a pension, it only costs you £800.

The amount of tax relief is even greater if your income is subject to the higher rates of income tax, as you can then claim extra tax relief on the pension contribution. However it is very important to remember that this additional relief is not credited automatically..... You have to claim it !!

Every tax year there are many higher-rate taxpayers that lose out on thousands of pounds of tax relief, due to the assumption that this extra tax relief will be claimed on their behalf. There is a time limit as to how far you can go back to claim past tax relief, so, if you think you may have missed claiming then it could be worth a review of your pensions to check.

whilst under their occupancy but were later blocked when no longer required. Milk churn stands are a reminder that dairy farming was once an important farming activity which has been in decline for several decades now.

Walk of the Month

With Grange Ramblers



A walk north west of Kendal – mainly across fields, past Whinfell Tarn, small hamlets and several farms. Note - can be boggy in places and with 14 stiles

DISTANCE: 7.25 miles DIFFICULTY: Moderate with 950 feet ascent TIME (INC BREAKS): 4.5 hours

Start: Lay-by off the A6 at Otter Bank – map reference SD 532972 (0S Explorer OL7)


1/ Head South from the lay-by then immediately turn left up Back Lane. Go 200 yards, turn left onto Dry Lane. At the road junction turn left then immediately right through the gate onto a field track. Keep on the main track to Selside School, Brackenrigg Side.

2/ Just past the School turn sharp right through the gate, proceed 200 yards, take the left fork to Steel Croft. Go through two gates and bear right in a field. Cross the road and pass High Biggesrbank Farm. At a junction of footpaths bear left to Low Biggersbank. Aim in the direction of the distant lodges. Cross a footbridge and then some boggy ground, up the bank and pass the lodges at Topthorn.

3/ Bear right then at the path junction right again to pass the Northern edge of Whinfell Tarn. Cross the road then turn left at the next road. Walk 300 yards, turn right then take the to Stone Hall. Take the track passing Stone Hall on your left to Moorbank.

4/ Turn left, go ½ mile to a junction of footpaths, turn left, then after 350 yards at Bracken Fold left again. Go another 350 yardsto a footpath junction, turn right. Cross a footbridge then after 350 yards bear right at the footpath junction to pass Field End, Old Field End, Patton Hall Farm and onto a road.

5/ Turn left, go 150 yards and turn right onto the path to Hipshow Farm and a road. Bear right, go 150 yards and turn left onto a path to Garnet Folds. Turn left and proceed for 1/3 mile to Tarn Bank, turn right along the path back to the start point at Otter Bank.

July field trips

The hay meadows at High Borrowdale were bright with white ox-eye daisies and yellow flowers. They were buzzing with insects, with swallows overhead, on our visit in early July. We met with Dr Jan Darrell, Policy Officer for Friends of the Lake District (FLD) at Hucks Bridge on the A6.

The valley is wild and remote with a harsh climate. The farmhouse is now just a ruin abandoned in 1951. FLD purchased the farmland in 2002, before the valley became part of the Lake District National Park in 2016. Jan gave a fascinating account of the many issues of land ownership facing a landscape charity. All the stone walls have been mended and fences put in to keep out sheep and deer, and hedges planted. A major success has been the restoration of hay meadows on the flatter in-bye valley land. The meadows are not cut until late July, even August, allowing the flowers to set seed. - 1-2 tsp sugar to taste

METHOD

Roughly crush the fennel seeds using a pestle and mortar.

Use a fork to strip the redcurrants off their stems. Put half of them into a bowl and crush them with a fork. Add the olive oil, sugar, lemon juice, and salt and pepper. Stir well to combine with the redcurrants. Peel the beetroot and either grate it



coarsely or cut it into very thin julienne matchsticks using a sharp knife or a mandoline. Put the beetroot into a bowl, spoon half the crushed redcurrant mixture over it, and stir.

Scatter the dressed beetroot out over a large plate. Shake over the remaining redcurrants and spoon over the rest of the dressing.

Lawsuit guitars

While it's a criminal offence to sell fake or copied items with an "intention to deceive", auctioneers can sell replicas provided it is clear to the buyer that they are not getting the real thing. When it comes to guitars, the sale of Chinese copies of Gibsons, known as "Chibsons", would be frowned upon and not in line with the ethics of our business.

However, one "copy" type is highly sought-after in the guitar market. These are known as "lawsuit guitars," and they have become very collectable.

With the explosion of rock and roll in the 1950s, demand for high-quality instruments boomed for acoustic and electric guitar manufacturers, such as Gibson, Martin, and Fender.

In this post-war era, there was a reluctance and suspicion of Japanese products in the US, so the instruments were branded to avoid suggesting their country of origin. For example, Hoshino Gakki made guitars under the brand name Ibanez.

By the early 1970s, Ibanez made very good copies of American models and sold them cheaply. At first, they used inferior materials, so they only really "looked" like the classics. However, by the mid-1970s, Ibanez, Takamine, and co. made replicas that were on par quality-wise with the original Gibson, Martin, and Fender models.

It's important to note that the term "lawsuit era" can be misleading. While it suggests that the big guns were taking companies to court every time a copy was produced, this wasn't the case. In fact, the only company and model Gibson challenged was the Ibanez Super Standard Les Paul copy with its similar headstock synonymous with the Gibson models. This was settled out of court.

WESTMORLAND AND FURNESS COUNCIL (W&FC) - LOCAL PLAN

W&FC are starting work on a new local plan for Westmorland and Furness. When this is adopted, it will replace all existing local plans.

The local plan explains W&FC strategy for new development and contains the policies that W&FC uses to shape and guide new development. The Local Plan plans for the new homes and all the other sorts of development that we need. It makes sure that they are built in the right places and in a way which is best for people and the environment.

When people apply to W&FC for planning permission to develop land or to change the use of a building, they use the policies in the local plan when they decide whether to grant planning permission and what conditions to attach to any consent.

There is to be a fresh Call for Sites. Even though those previously put forward and meant to have been filtered out earlier this year will be considered, the advice is that each should be resubmitted.

The timetable (which could be subject to alteration) and key stages are:

- A fresh Call for Sites. The process started on the 8th July 2024 with engagement over the next 2-3 months. Anyone can put forward a site for consideration, closing date for applications is the 30th September 2024.
- Details are to be made known throughout the W&FC website, social media and by post. The Parish Council will display details on the website, noticeboards within the Parish, community centre in Allithwaite and Cartmel Village Hall and other public places.
- Responses to the proposed Plan can be made online at: https://www.westmorlandandfurness.gov.uk/localplan.

The program outlined by W&FC, which could be subject to change, has the following key stages:

- Individual responses returned by the 9th September 2024, call for sites by the 30th September 2024.
- · Parish and Town Councils by the 30th September 2024.
- Approximately 6-9 months review and consolidation of responses.
- The Local Plan will then be independently reviewed in 2026 and (hopefully) adopted in 2027.

Key Messages - This is about listening

Before W&FC put pen to paper on the new plan, they are starting with an early conversation with parishioners about the places we live, work and visit across the Local Plan area. Your views will help shape the vision for the Local Plan, the issues that it needs to address and how these will be tackled.

W&FC hope that everyone who cares about the future will want to be involved. It's important that W&FC listen to as many people as possible to understand their point of view as the Local Plan should reflect the views of our diverse communities.

W&FC want you to think about not just the here and now, but

what is best for the future of the area – the things that your children or grandchildren will want from future development. The Local Plan will look 20 years and beyond into the future, to the year 2045.

CHILDRENS PLAY AREAS AND GREEN SPACES

The Parish Council has received a number of concerns with regard to dogs tied up or wandering in the King George V Playground and the Allithwaite Orchard and Meadow area.

The council took the decision to continue the "No Dogs Policy" into the orchard and meadow including the permissive footpath (which is not a bridleway) to have a continuous playground for the children of the parish free of any dog related mess.

DOG FOULING AND NOISE

The Parish Council continues to receive an increasing number of concerns with regard to dog fouling in the Parish. It's a pity that the minority of dog owners feel that it's fine to allow their dogs to foul in public areas which in effect is anti-social behaviour which is a finable offence.

Another issue which is a concern to some residents is noise created by dogs which are constantly barking and disturbing residents over long and regular periods of time which also may be during unsociable hours. ELECTRICITY SUPPLY WITHIN THE PARISH

It has been brought to the parish councils' attention that residents and business are experiencing reductions in voltage at peak periods (Saturday nights and Sunday mornings). This results in electrical equipment switching off and on again and the loss of WI-FI.

The parish council have written to ENW with the following questions:

- The reason for this loss of service.
- What records ENW maintain regarding reductions in voltage.

• Whether the ACPC area experiences more reductions in voltage than comparable areas.

Councillors have attempted on four occasions to address this matter with ENW and have received no response to-date.

VAT – PARISH COUNCIL

Following requests from local charities it should be noted the Parish Council is unable to reclaim VAT on their behalf (see 6.3 of VAT Notice 749).

ALLITHWAITE AND CARTMEL PARISH COUNCIL RECORDS – W&FC ARCHIVES

W&FC (formerly SLDC) hold records for Allithwaite, Lower and Holker Upper Parish Councils [ref WPC 29]. Various amalgamations led up to Allithwaite and Cartmel joining in 2020, and one of the minute books in the collection covers this date. Parishioners can browse the list of items held in the collection at CASCAT: Collection Browser (cumbria.gov.uk).

County Hall is closing on 30 September 2024 and the archives will be running an interim service after that date which will be a temporary search room in Kendal Library, further details to be confirmed. Collections will remain at County Hall for the foreseeable future and will continue to be securely stored in the existing strongrooms. Archive staff will be onsite as usual. There will no doubt come a time when the collections will have to vacate County Hall and depositors will be updated when this happens.

Lasting Powers of Attorney – Will I lose control and are they safe?

Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPAs) are legal documents by which an individual may appoint someone else to make decisions on their behalf relating to their health and welfare and/or property and financial decisions.

Drawing up an LPA while in good physical and mental health does not mean that an individual is giving up control. It is simply putting measures in place for the future, in case they are needed.

A Property and Finance LPA can be used when the individual has lost mental capacity but also if the individual has not lost capacity but there is a physical problem such as old age and frailty or the effects of suffering a stroke, for example. While an individual continues to have capacity to manage their own financial affairs, an attorney can only act with the individual's knowledge and approval.

A Health and Welfare LPA cannot be used by the attorneys unless or until the individual has completely lost all ability to make any decisions themselves. It is possible for the individual to give their attorneys the power to make life sustaining treatment decisions.

The choice of attorney is very important, and they should always be someone the individual trusts implicitly such as family members or close friends. It is possible to choose a professional person to act as an attorney, usually where there are no family members or close friends or there are safeguarding issues.

The Mental Capacity Act 2005 imposes legal safeguards to protect the individual's interests and it is an overriding legal requirement that the attorney always acts in the individual's best interests. They must always help an individual to make a decision rather than just making a decision without first establishing if the individual has a view or is capable of making the decision themself. Attorneys also have limited ability to use the individual's property to benefit anyone else other than for example, birthday or Christmas presents to close family members. An attorney cannot act under an LPA to change an individual's will and they are not allowed to pay themselves for what they do, unless specified in the will, and are only entitled to out of pocket expenses.

An LPA must be registered with the Office of the Public Guardian before it is valid and can be used.


