



There is, unfortunately, a clear link between the effects of Christmas and a surge in couples instituting divorce proceedings in January. However, the effects of the extended Christmas holiday can also highlight fractures within a family over inheritances - actual or expected.

Extended periods of time with the family can reveal serious tensions between the wealthier grandparent generation and younger family members possibly suffering from career and financial instability. The pressure to maintain a facade of family harmony often coupled with alcohol consumption can lead to arguments and a demand to 'get my inheritance'. This can be especially true for the first Christmas family get together after the death of a significant family member who may have been the glue keeping the various family elements together.

Do you think you may have been unfairly treated by someone's will? What if you want to contest the will - what does that mean?

There are two possible routes. One is the 'legal technicality' route - where the will may not have been properly signed or where it has been signed under duress or coercion. This is a complex area to make a challenge, and expert legal advice is crucial.

The second route is that the will itself is valid, but you feel the provisions for you are not CE OF MIND SINCE 1903 fair and reasonable. In this case a claim under the terms of the Inheritance (Provision for Family and Dependents) Act 1975 is the route to follow. Again, this is a complex area where the categories of claimant are restricted and where key steps must be taken within certain time limits. Of course, you may be on the receiving end of a challenge to the will or its provisions and in that case, it is essential to get clear legal advice before acting.

It is getting towards that time of year once more when we should review our 'end of tax year checklist', the tax breaks on offer to each of us are often left unused and therefore lost.

There are many tax allowances available, a few of the main ones to consider are as follows:

Personal allowance:	£12,570
ISA allowance:	£20,000
Capital Gains Tax allowance:	£3,000

for an individual and £1,500 for trusts.

Personal Savings Allowance: £1,000 for basic rate taxpayers and £500 for higher rate taxpayers.

Dividend allowance:

Pension Annual Allowance: £60,000

Local GP to run Fuerteventura for St Mary's Hospice



John Culling is a local GP and a doctor at St Mary's Hospice, Ulverston and would like to support the amazing team at St Mary's Hospice and the incredible service they provide.

He is solo running the GR131, which is a 180km trail route from the north to the south of Fuerteventura over the space of a week. This runs through some volcanic, semi-desert landscape and some isolated, rough and windy terrains.

John is a keen runner and has set himself this challenge (for me it's a big one!) in his fiftieth year to try to support the cause and raise some money for a service that has helped so many of his patients, friends and family.

He has worked for the hospice for many years now and really believes in the service.

John says,

'I am very proud to work here and It's been such a pleasure to work alongside such dedicated colleagues tirelessly providing excellent care for anyone in Furness and South Lakes who has life-limiting illness and requires our help.'

The overall running costs of the Hospice are currently £5.5m per year and they receive just over £1m from government funding. Their services are always free for patients and families but eight out of every ten patients has their care funded by voluntary income and without



people making donations and giving charitable gifts, the hospice wouldn't be here.

John has been a local GP for 24 years and has also worked for St Mary's Hospice for a decade. In response to the question 'Have you been to the Canary Islands before?', John says,

'Many times - recently (this April just gone) I ran the length of Lanzarote from top to bottom (about 100km) -It's a route called the GR131 that runs through all seven of the Canary Islands from north-east to south-west - traditionally walked over weeks - but I don't have weeks so I'm running each one as a challenge. I didn't seek to raise any £££s for my Lanzarote run as I just wanted to ensure I could complete it first!'

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Saving Windermere Talk

The environmental group, PEAT, held a public meeting on Tuesday 26th November at Lower Holker village Hall with a talk by Matt Staniek, who is the lead for the Save Windemere Lake Campaign. The talk was very well attended.

1. Matt's account of the progress of the campaign over the last 4 years mirrors many of the problems facing our local campaign group on the River Eea.

- 2. Issues of pollution considered by the Windemere campaign were.
 - (i) United Utilities *spillages*
 - (ii) Agriculture
 - (iii) Septic tanks
 - (iv) Environment Agency

3. United Utilities' practices and refusal to give data/ information on processes proved to be most difficult and the most responsible for the pollution of Lake Windemere!

Samples have been taken from ABOVE the UU treatment works in numerous locations.

Samples taken at times likely to give a good result!

Average levels are used when it is the higher levels which cause the MOST pollution.

The above items lead to delays/lack of information to act upon for the campaign

4. Role of the Environment Agency

Damaging cuts over the last five years have left the EA work force unable to do their jobs properly. This has been further exacerbated by the fact that many leading officials in the EA go on to work in senior positions in UU and it's difficult not to see this as collusive and a conflict of interest.

5. Agriculture

Around Lake Windemere agriculture is not a problem. The farming is mainly arable and farming practices are changing and doesn't lead to pollution of the Lake.

6. Septic tanks

These are a problem and there may be many more over larger areas than is realised. The solution is to join these tanks to the main sewage system, and there is a fund of around £50 million available for this. However, many owners have not taken this up !

Question – do enough septic tank owners know that this fund is available?

Lake Annecy is a comparable biological lake to Lake Windemere with a similar population: 130,000 in the summer/70,000 in the winter. The powers that are responsible for Lake Annecy have put a pipe system all around the lake which leads to a large treatment works and the treated water then goes into a river. The standard of treatment is exceptionally high.

United Utilities have said that they have looked at doing the above on Lake Windemere, but they have given Astronomical costs as to the reason why this can't be done. They refused to give Matt a breakdown of the costs

In conclusion, whilst Matt thinks that there is a need to end privatisation as a systemic reform nationally, he doesn't think it is necessary to deliver for Windemere. What would give Windemere the greatest protection would be for United Utilities to stop illegally dumping sewage into the Lake and for them to be held accountable for their actions.

Birth services set to be restored at Kendal maternity ward



South Lakes MP Tim Farron has warmly welcomed today's news that birth services at Helme Chase Maternity Unit in Kendal will be reinstated, following a local community campaign.

Birth services have been suspended at Westmorland General Hospital since May due to significant staffing issues. However, University Hospitals of Morecambe Bay NHS Foundation Trust have announced that birth services will be reinstated in February. In September, Tim presented a petition to Parliament, signed by more than 2,200 people.

Tim said: "I am absolutely delighted that we've won our campaign to save Helme Chase Maternity Unit! I'm incredibly grateful to the Trust for their hard work in filling the midwife vacancies.

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Hundreds aim to walk 40 miles in 2025 event to raise £500k for charity



Hundreds of people will take on a 40-mile walk challenge on one day through the English Lake District in 2025 to try to raise more than £500k for charity.

The Keswick to Barrow Walk smashed all records by raising $\pounds503,000$ for 210 charities in 2024 – and has set its sights on going one step further in 2025.

In total 2,866 walkers took part in the Keswick to Barrow Walk (K2B) and Coniston to Barrow Walk (C2B) on May 11, 2024 – the 57th year since the annual K2B first started.





K2B organisers recently announced the incredible sum raised from its 2024 event – and immediately set their sights on breaking the record in 2025.

They are appealing for more walkers – individuals, businesses and organisations – from more parts of the UK and beyond to take part in the 2025 event on May 10.

Registration opens on January 2 for teams of between four and 12 walkers and is open to anyone who wants to take on the walking challenge.

Roy Barnes, a member of the Keswick to Barrow Walk committee, said: "We want to appeal to walkers from all over the country and beyond to take part in what is an amazing event.

"It's a challenge to walk 40 miles in one day, but the camaraderie among everyone who takes part, and all the supporters, makes it a truly memorable experience.

"The feeling of reaching the finish line is an experience and an achievement which will stay with you for the rest of your life. Knowing you have raised money for brilliant charities along the way and really helped improve people's lives is the icing on the cake.

"We have some walkers who love it so much they have taken part more than 20 times. They get the bug! If you haven't taken part yet, make sure you make a resolution that 2025 is the year that you



do. You won't regret it."

Roy added that the amazing amount of money raised by the 2024 event was a fabulous surprise to everyone involved.

He said: "For several years we have been just under the £400,000 threshold for the amount raised by K2B and C2B walkers. We thought we would hit £400,000 in 2020 but unfortunately Covid had other ideas.

"Since then we've just missed that £400,000 goal until this year. This year, not only did we hit this milestone, we exceeded it by over £100,000 by raising an incredible £503,000. This money makes a real difference to more than 200 amazing charities and good causes who support people across our communities.

"Now we want to top that in 2025!"

Families and friends kicked off the 2024 festive season with local charity CancerCare at their highly anticipated Santa Dash which raised over £6,000 (including Gift Aid).

Participants were not to be deterred by the threat of Storm Bert, with over 100 dashers taking to the streets to complete a one-mile fun run in their most festive fancy dress ahead of Lancaster BID's Christmas lights switch-on.

CancerCare, a local charity who provide complementary therapies and counselling for people in North Lancashire and South Cumbria affected by cancer and bereavement, have been holding their Santa Dash for some 15 years.

Participants were encouraged to raise sponsorship ahead of their dash, with the family who raised the most being invited on stage to switch on the Christmas lights alongside Santa and the Beyond Radio team. Long-term CancerCare supporter Kerry and her daughters Harper and Isabela and their grandmother Vicky were this year's winners after raising £726 between them.

"This was the best day of my life," said Harper when she stepped off stage. Several of the dashers have been attending the annual Santa Dash every year since its inception.

Graham Pye held his own fundraiser

this year. Graham and his family were supported by CancerCare after Graham's wife was diagnosed with mouth cancer in November 2022.

"Nobody expects to get this dreadful disease, certainly not in your household," Graham said. "Myself and my nine-yearold daughter entered the Santa Dash to show our support to the families who are going through the same tough times."

In total, CancerCare's dashers raised over £2,500 via their JustGiving pages.

Local drumming group Samba Espirito, who support this event each year, provided a party atmosphere, bringing samba rhythms to boost the enthusiasm of the Santa Dash runners.

Lancaster museum was transformed into a magical grotto with children meeting Santa, playing with the elves, writing their Christmas letters and choosing a gift from Santa's workshop.

CancerCare's Event Lead Fundraiser Lisa Lambert said: "We had the most special day and thankfully Storm Bert held off so we enjoyed a dry dash! We can't thank our dashers enough for coming along with so much enthusiasm and for supporting us. It was great fun watching the sea of Santas, elves and reindeers getting race ready.

"This is one of the largest totals we've ever raised for a Lancaster Santa Dash and these funds will provide vital support to people in our local communities who are dealing with the devastating effects of a cancer diagnosis or the loss of someone they love."Thanks must go to supporters in the local business community including event sponsors FGH Security. Grange and District Natural History winter programme

In November Professor Richard Bardgett illustrated some of his painstaking research into soils around the world.

His interest in soil dates from a summer job he undertook at Merlewood, when it was a major research centre. As the soils around Grange formed c.10,000 years ago, it is effectively a non-renewable resource. He explained why life in the soil is so important, as it helps produce most of our food. Nearly 60% of all species on Earth are in soil. Whereas some past societies cherished the soil, a 2015 report found that many of the world's soils are in poor condition. We need to look after the soil as a living organism. In our gardens, Richard urged us not to leave bare soil, but to cover and nourish with compost and to grow a variety of plants to encourage a high biodiversity and productivity of insect pollinators.

Stephen Mott gave an illustrated account of his studies in the Arctic Islands of Svalbard, 79°-81°N. Stephen showed spectacular photos of Svalbard's wildlife: Kittiwakes, Glaucous Gull, Black Guillemot, Bearded Seal, Barnacle Geese, Skua, Snow Bunting, Walrus, and many of the tiny Arctic flowers, growing close to the ground, like the pale-yellow Arctic Poppy. Much of the land is polar desert, with no trees. Permafrost, or permanently frozen ground occurs at depth. As the climate warms, this melts and the ground slumps. Summer melt also causes glaciers to shed icebergs into tidal fjords. These mix with the sea water, stimulating growth of plankton and other microorganisms, which brings in many birds, bears, and seals. With climate breakdown, there is less multi-year ice; the Arctic Ocean could soon be ice-free and the wildlife there will need to adapt or disappear.

From OXO cubes to collectable cards

Andy Bowden is the Specialist Valuer for Stamps, Cigarette Cards, and Postcards at 1818 Auctioneers. In this article, Andy explores the history of trade cards.

"Card collecting dates back to the late Victorian era, when cigarette manufacturers included pictorial cards to protect packets. These cards formed sets, encouraging repeat purchases and brand loyalty. However, trade cards predate cigarette cards, originating in the late 17th century.

"German scientist Justus Liebig, founder of LEMCO (later OXO), inadvertently popularized trade cards. Starting in 1872, LEMCO issued over 1,800 card series over 120 years. By the 1920s and 1930s, firms like Fry's, Cadbury, and Typhoo followed suit, mimicking cigarette cards by adding collectable picture cards to their products.

"In the 1950s, trade cards surged in popularity as paper rationing ended and cigarette cards were banned during World War II. Food manufacturers, including Brooke Bond Tea, Kellogg's, and Bassetts, embraced trade cards. Meanwhile, in the U.S., brands like Cracker Jack and American Caramel Company issued cards aimed at children, broadening the collecting market.

"Trade cards have covered countless topics, from sports to art, and new cards attract new generations of collectors. In 2022, a 1952 Topps Mickey Mantle baseball card fetched \$12.6 million, while a Pokémon Illustrator Pikachu card sold for \$5.75 million.

"The Pokémon franchise highlights a shift in trading card evolution, with the 1990s introducing game-based card collecting. Today, trading cards continue to reflect the times, fueling public imagination. What's next for trade cards remains an exciting prospect."

DECORATIVE ITEMS/ADVERTISEMENTS IN THE HIGHWAY

Concerns have been raised with Westmorland and Furness Council regarding businesses across Cartmel

improperly placing A-Boards on the highways and footways. While prioritising the safety of the public on the highway, W&FC actively involve affected stakeholders, including local businesses, Parish Councils and community groups, in discussions of how businesses and services should be promoted appropriately.

Following a thorough assessment of Cartmel by W&FC, it has been observed that certain sections of highway lack adequate footway widths to accommodate A-Boards, and decorative planters. W&FC have written to all businesses in Cartmel requesting they follow the criteria for displaying 'A' Boards.

Should the specified criteria not be met, it is imperative that the free-standing sign or decorative item is promptly removed. Westmorland and Furness Council reserve the right to take necessary action for removal where necessary, therefore the proactive efforts of businesses in Cartmel would be appreciated.

THE LATEST SCAMS

Winter Fuel Payment scams

Police have issued a warning about scam messages offering extra cost of living support ahead of the colder months after a series of reports of people receiving messages claiming to offer help with winter fuel payments.

The government and local authorities have been encouraging people who may be eligible for pension credit to apply as this would mean they would still receive the Winter Fuel Payment. However, the council or government would not ask people to click on links to make a claim for anything. And those who are eligible for winter fuel payments will be paid automatically.

Reporting scam emails

If you receive a scam email, you should send it to report@ phishing.gov.uk and delete it. If you do grant someone access to your device, turn it off immediately and disconnect from your wi-fi. When you switch the device back on, remove any newly downloaded software by searching through your recent downloads.

If you've lost any money or if scammers have gained access to your bank details, contact your bank straight away and report the scam to Action Fraud.

What to do if you've fallen victim:

- Let your bank know as soon as possible and monitor your bank statements regularly for any unusual activity.
- If you suspect your identity may have been stolen you can check your credit file quickly and easily online. Use a reputable service provider and follow up on any unexpected or suspicious results.
- If you have been a victim of fraud or cyber-crime, report it to Action Fraud at actionfraud.police.uk, or by calling 0300 123 2040.

How to shop online safely ...

Software updates

Make sure you've installed the latest software and app updates. Criminals use weaknesses in software to attack your devices and steal information, such as your payment details.

Email accounts

Use a strong, separate password for your email account. Criminals can use your email to access other online accounts, such as those you use for online shopping.

Phishing

Don't click on a link in an unexpected email or text. The volume of online shopping related phishing emails increases significantly during the holiday period. Remember, if a deal seems too good to be true, it probably is.

Payment methods

Don't pay for goods or services by bank transfer unless you know and trust the person. Payments via bank transfer offer you no protection if you become a victim of fraud.

With Christmas approaching, there is still time yet.



Common misconceptions surrounding Child Arrangements and the Children Act: -

Children have no rights

Children have legal rights that are protected by national and international laws, such as the right to education, healthcare, protection from abuse, and the right to express their views in matters that affect them. Sometimes when an application is made to the court for a Child Arrangements Order the court may direct for a report considering the ascertainable wishes and feelings a child. It will then be a matter for the court to balance the child's wishes and feelings against other factors to ensure an Order is made that is in the best interests of the child.

Child maintenance is only for Mothers

There's a misconception that child maintenance is primarily for mothers. However, both parents are responsible for financially supporting their children and child maintenance aims to ensure that children receive adequate financial support from both parents, regardless of their gender. Therefore, it is the parent with primary care of the children who is entitled to claim maintenance, not just the mother.

I am on the child's birth certificate so I have legal rights?

This is the case for every child born after 1st December 2003. If you are named on a child's birth certificate, you have secured the legal status of Parental Responsibility. This consists of all rights, duties, powers and responsibilities which by law, a parent of a child has in relation to the child and the child's property.

I have Parental Responsibility so can make any decision for my child that I want?

There is little statutory guidance about when a person who shares Parental Responsibility is able to act independently or when they must act in consultation with the others who share Parental Responsibility. However, when more than one person holds Parental Responsibility for a child, there are only some decisions that can be made independently. Other decisions require agreement from all other people who hold Parental Responsibility. Alternatively, it may be necessary to notify the other person with Parental Responsibility rather than obtain their consent.

The court favour the mother in Children Act Proceedings?

The court favours the child, and only the child. The paramount consideration of the court is what is best for the child or children subject to the application. Whilst the court will listen to each parent about what arrangements they would like to implement and what each parent thinks is best for the child, the court will only make decisions that the court thinks is best. Accordingly, if it is best for a child/children to live with their Mother and have contact with their Father, that is what the court will order. However, likewise, if it is best for a child to live with their Father and have contact with their Mother, then this is what the court will order.

Here we are again at the end of another year, and as seems to have become tradition, I find myself taking time to look back over the last 12 months of the property market and the wider world.

Last December, I was contemplating the settling of interest rates and the improvements of the market after what had been a year of consolidation. There were even suggestions of a yearning for change. Well, we certainly saw that towards the back end of this year. Hastily called General Elections and October Budgets from the new Government, brought potential hurdles to the market which seem to have been taken in stride. The effects of an altogether bigger election, over 'The Pond', await to be seen.

As expected, the interest rate levels were cut mid-year in a helping hand to all those looking to borrow, including those looking for mortgage finance. The rate of inflation dropped below target and the cost of living came down (although it may not feel like it for some).

During this time, the property market has been busier than the previous year, and we have seen continued activity which has been unabated by any of the potential banana skins the year tried to throw in its path.

The main stumbling block in a sale process has become time. Average timescales for a property to proceed from agreed sale, to exchange and completion, currently sits at 16 weeks. This can lead to anxious buyers and sellers and heightens the need for effective communication and sales progression.

The beginning of this New Year promises to be a busy one. The interest in property tends to start mid-January, and we have the impending reintroduction of Stamp Duty Land Tax at the lower starting point of £125,000 come the beginning of April. There will be a big push for any property already under offer, to be exchanged by then.

Once again, the signs for the property market look positive, and after the impressive year we have had across the company with regard to the sheer number of sales over target, we are expecting this success to continue. Hopefully, your year is as positive as the property market has been over the previous 12 months.

MARMALADE BISCUITS

These biscuits blend the comfort of home baking with the zing of marmalade. When you use the finest Cumbrian ingredients, they're extra special. Dalemain Jane's marmalade has a story worth savouring along with the taste. It's part of the collection of Dalemain marmalades from the home of the Dalemain World Marmalade Awards.

INGREDIENTS

(makes ten biscuits)

- 100g Winter Tarn cold butter, cubed
- 200g Eden Yard plain flour
- 100g caster sugar
- 1 small Myers Farm egg, lightly beaten
- 3 tbsp Dalemain Jane's (thick cut) marmalade

METHOD

- 1. Rub the butter and sugar into the flour until it looks like rough breadcrumbs. Slowly add the egg to bring the dough together. Wrap it in baking parchment and place it in the fridge for two hours or overnight.
- 2. Preheat your oven to 180°C and line two large flat baking trays with parchment.
- 3. Roll the dough to about 5mm thick and cut out 20 circles. Place 10 of them onto one of the baking trays. Cut stars out of the centre of the other ten and place them on the other tray.
- 4. Bake for about 10 minutes until golden. Once cool enough to handle, place on a wire rack to cool completely.
- 5. Spoon some marmalade onto the full circles and place the other biscuits on top.
- 6. Recipe adapted from the original by Michelle Darmody in The Irish Examiner

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
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
