Since Rachel Reeves announced her Inheritance Tax (IHT) changes last October there has rightly been much publicity around the plight of farmers. Thankfully, however, the Budget did not remove other perhaps lesser-known tax reliefs which our clients are often unaware of.

Inheritance Tax

Inheritance Tax (IHT) is a complex area made even more so by the Autumn budget, however, it is useful to understand the basic allowances available.

The Nil Rate Band (NRB) is the amount you can gift on death before IHT is payable and remains at £325,000 per individual. In 2017 the Residence Nil Rate Band (RNRB) was introduced providing up to £175,000 per individual, however to benefit, the home must pass to direct descendants. This will be reduced if the value of the property is less than the RNRB, or if the value of an individual's estate exceeds £2M. These allowances mean that an individual has up to £500,000 of Nil Rate Bands available to them and on second death a couple could benefit from a combined nil rate band of up to £1M (2 x £325,000 plus 2 x £175,000).

The Autumn budget has frozen these allowances until April 2030 and announced that from April 2027 pension death benefits will be included in the assessment for IHT. Many individuals that previously did not have an IHT liability will now exceed their allowances once their pensions are included in their estate so it is more important than ever that financial plans are reviewed to make sure all is being done to help mitigate the potential liability.

Inheritance Tax is a complex area and we would strongly recommend that you seek advice from a professional adviser to explore your options for reducing your IHT liability.

South Lakes Housing are writing to provide the community of Grange with an update on the progress of the Yewbarrow Lodge redevelopment project.

Our contractor, L&W Wilson, has made significant progress with the demolition, and the majority of the building has now been removed. In our previous update, we anticipated that demolition would be completed by Christmas. However, this timeline has been extended, and we now expect work to continue until late February 2025.

During this period, there will be some noisy works required to break up the concrete and rocks recovered from the demolition. While the site team is working hard to minimise noise disruption, we understand that this may cause some inconvenience to nearby residents, and we apologise for any disturbances caused.

We will continue to keep the residents of Grange informed as the project progresses via Grange Now, including details about the demolition and the next phases of redevelopment.

St Paul's Church; Charity and Co. and particularly St. Charles Church that hosted the Drop In through its later years.

United Utilities: 0 | Save Windermere: 1 – UU Withdraws **First-Tier Tribunal Appeals**

Grange Now continue to report on the pollution of Windermere as our coverage area is immediately downhill and so the issue directly affects us all.

In a monumental victory for Save Windermere, United Utilities (UU) has withdrawn their appeals to the First-Tier Tribunal, where they argued that the Information Commissioner (ICO) was wrong in in their decision telling them to release environmental information to the campaign. They have also subsequently released the environmental data they had been fighting to withhold from the public.

Save Windermere, as a second respondent in this case, worked tirelessly alongside esteemed barristers Nicholas Ostrowski and Samual Glanville, who provided pro-bono work for the campaign. Together, we presented compelling evidence demonstrating why this information should be made public under existing legislation as well as providing evidence to the ICO for their initial decision on this case. An example of the complaints we have been making is provided below in the hope that it will help others in a similar predicament.

This decision marks a significant milestone, achieved through the relentless efforts

of Save Windermere over the past few years to hold United Utilities accountable for their lack of transparency. Using established legislation, the campaign has dismantled numerous arguments presented by UU to justify the withholding of data. We have been told that our requests were manifestly unreasonable, that the data did not qualify as environmental information, our requests are too broad, the data sets were incomplete and that its release would perturb the course of justice; the list of excuses went on and on. Today's announcement demonstrates that UU has yielded to the ICO's decision to prioritise the overwhelming public interest in this matter over UU's claims of discretion regarding internal communications. This was one of the few excuses they had left.

Since the decision, United Utilities has communicated readily with the campaign. In addition to releasing the appeal information, they have also provided a significant amount of additional data we had previously requested. We commend this new approach by UU and the leadership decisions that led to this increased transparency about how their activities impact England's largest lake.





Woman takes on 40-mile challenge to support local charity who helped her family after father's death

A local woman is urging others to join her on a tough 40-mile walking challenge to support the local charity who helped her family when her father died.

second time. In 2024, she completed the challenge and raised $\pounds1,700$ for the charity.

Jenna's dad was diagnosed with bowel cancer and sadly passed away in September 2023.

"His passing was traumatic in itself but the way it happened added another layer of trauma," Jenna explained. "The family were all away on a cruise when Dad took a turn for the worse and passed away suddenly."

Jenna's family members have since used the services offered by CancerCare.

In December, Jenna was on the hunt for a personal challenge she could take on to both push herself and complete in memory of her late dad.

"I decided to have a stab at the K2B," she said. "It was perfect because it gave me a personal goal, I could raise money for charity in honour of Dad, the walking would help improve my physical health and getting outside in nature would benefit me mentally.

"At the time I made the decision to do the K2B, a dog randomly came to live with me due to unforeseen circumstances which



made walking so much easier and more fun."

Jenna began walking between two and three miles everyday with her Cocker Spaniel, Rory. They would head out after work and they took on longer hikes in the Lake District at the weekends.

OVERNIGHT WHOLEGRAIN PANCAKES

These hearty, American-style pancakes brim with the goodness of whole grains and a touch of natural sweetness from organic blueberries. A simple overnight soak unlocks the full potential of the grains, enhancing their flavour. A quick mix and a few minutes on the hob the following day yields a stack of golden pancakes that are nourishing and delicious and provide sustained energy beyond breakfast.

Prep: 10 minutes, plus overnight soaking **Cook:** 4-6 minutes per batch - **Serves:** 4

INGREDIENTS

- 100g giant oat flakes (or millet, barley or buckwheat flakes)
- 120g wholegrain spelt flour
- 240ml warm water
- 2 tbsp plain yogurt, kefir or lemon juice
- 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda (baking soda)
- ¼ tsp fine sea salt
- 1 egg, beaten with a fork
- 50g Low Sizergh Barn's frozen organic blueberries
- extra virgin olive oil, for cooking
- lemon and organic sugar or butter

METHOD

- 1. Mix the oats or flakes, flour, water, and yogurt, kefir or lemon juice in a medium bowl. Leave to soak, covered, overnight at room temperature.
- 2. The next morning, add the bicarbonate of soda and salt and mix well. Add the egg and mix well. Add the blueberries and/or nuts and/or seeds, if using.
- Heat a frying pan with a light coating of olive oil over a medium-low heat and drop in 2 tablespoons of batter for each pancake. Cook for 2-3 minutes on each side until lightly browned.
- 4. Serve in a stack with your favourite toppings butter and a little sugar, maple syrup or lemon and sugar.

Grange and District Natural History

Cake cutting

At the Members' Evening in December 2024, Grange and District Natural History Society re-enacted a celebratory cake cutting for the Society's 70th anniversary., with a cake cut by the original 'cake cutters' from 2004. Founded in 1954 the Society celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2004, with a cake cut at a luncheon at the Netherwood Hotel. That cake was cut by Lis Fell and Pam Wilson, Secretary and Vice Chair at the time. The evening also included short talks, on curlews, Windermere surveys, botanical holidays and the canal cruise, ending with photos of the best natural history finds of the year.

2025 winter talks started with David Marshall of Cumbria Bat Group telling us about his research visits to the Calakmul Biosphere Reserve on the Yucatan Peninsula, to survey bats in the seasonal forest. Operation Wallacea operates field trips for students, who experience 'real science', handling equipment (but not bats- you need to be a registered bat handler), and recording the identifying characteristics of bats caught in mist nets. Huge fruit-eating bats are most frequently caught. Nectar-, insect-eating



and vampire bats less so. Even after years of research, the number of bat species is not fully known. On his next visit in 2025, David hopes to focus on the bats living in crevices in Mayan ruins. We plan to hold a local bat walk later in September. Lectures continue to March. Full details are on the web site www.grangenats.uk. Visitors are always welcome.

Fibrus superfast broadband is a family favourite

DEALING WITH UNWANTED DOORSTEP CALLERS

Please be aware that Police have received several reports of groups of door-to-door sellers who have become aggressive on a number of occasions in our area.

The sellers are often pushy and persistent and sometimes aggressive to try and make sales and some people will buy the products just to get rid of them. This is not a good idea as the more sales they get in a particular area, the more likely they are to return in the future. If these people return, call the police on 101 with a description of them and any associated vehicle they may be using. In an emergency, always use 999.

POLICE REPORT – CARTMEL PENINSULA

Our community team have been busy on mobile and foot patrol in the Grange, Allithwaite, Cartmel, Flookburgh, Cark and Lindale areas. Inconsiderate and dangerous parking is increasingly causing problems around our schools, putting the safety of children and others at risk. Cars parking inconsiderately on zig-zag lines cause visibility issues for pedestrians of all ages who are crossing the road network to get to and from school. We are paying particular attention to parking around local schools and offenders' risk being fined.

Please don't:

- Block the road emergency vehicles and other traffic may need access.
- Park on yellow lines, zigzags or block the school entrance.
- Park on the pavement, across dropped kerbs or residents' driveways.
- Park opposite or within 10 metres of a junction.
- Park where you will cause inconvenience to other road users.
- Leave your vehicle with the engine still running.
- Stop in the middle of the road to drop your child off, even for a few seconds.

Be vigilant and report suspicious activity

There have been a number of reports of theft of heating oil and diesel recently in the South Lakes area. Please be vigilant and consider security measures for fuel tanks such as padlocks, anti-siphon devices and fuel level alarms. Please continue to report any suspicious activity and vehicles.

In rural areas this time of year, dog owners need to be vigilant about keeping dogs on leads around livestock. Sheep worrying is a criminal offence. Dogs chasing or attacking sheep can cause a great deal of stress, miscarriages, horrific injuries or even death. Those in control or ownership of the dog can be prosecuted and the courts have the power to impose a destruction order on your dog.

CUMBRIA POLICE - WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PROTECT YOURSELF FROM FRAUD?

Protect your online accounts: the password you choose for your email account should be different from all your other account passwords. We recommend using three random words to create a strong and memorable password, also look into using 2-step verification (2SV) where possible.

Take the time to do your research: Do a thorough online search before making any big financial decisions. Ensure you are checking the authenticity of the company or organisation before making any investments, donations to charity or booking tickets for a concert, event or holiday.

Be cautious about how you send money: avoid paying via bank transfer and don't be pressured into transferring large sums of money. Any trusted organisation will not force you to transfer money on the spot and only a fraudster will try to rush you. For making purchases online, use a credit card if you can.

Be wary of unsolicited emails, texts,

QR codes or contact on social media: from seeing unbelievably good deals on tickets or holidays, to seeing a suspiciously cheap prices on items advertised, always double check the authenticity of what you are going to buy online before making a purchase or paying upfront fees.


ALLITHWAITE FREE MINI LIBRARY

The children then worked together to create series and parallel circuits testing the effect of different components within a circuit. We also identified electrical hazards within the home.

Is this the year for property moves?

Well the New Year has started with a bang (and not just my own experiences with icy ground)! The end of last year was curtailed by a late Budget which saw a softening on sales through to the Christmas period. Understandable hesitation before and after the Budget, as we awaited any form of economic response, merged into the annual slowing during December. However, the market endured and sales still happened.

The dawn of the New Year seems to have brought an increase in homebuyers with a quarterly increase in the percentage of sold property on the market. Also, April brings the reintroduction of the lower level threshold of stamp duty on purchases at £125,000 and the decrease of the first time buyer stamp duty exemption from £425,000 to £300,000 (admittedly this may not affect our area as much as those further south).

This said there are still murmurings of interest rate reductions in the coming months and personally, I think the stamp duty changes will be accepted as they were in the past. There will be interesting times ahead for our conveyancing teams as those with already agreed purchases will be pushing for a pre-April completion. Sadly, with the legal processes running at an average 16 weeks, this is going to be unlikely for anyone who hasn't agreed before the Christmas period.

New Inheritance Tax Rules Could Reshape Farming in the UK

What are the changes to inheritance tax?

Starting 6 April 2026, the full 100% inheritance tax (IHT) relief for agricultural and business property is capped at £1 million. Assets above this face a reduced IHT rate of up to 20%, meaning farmers could face an IHT bill like never before.




