





It is a fact of modern life that instances of elder abuse - whether financial or physical - are increasing. It is even sadder when those who carry out the abuse are either close family members or those who care and look after an elderly vulnerable person.

Financial abuse can be blatant and obvious - acting as someone's attorney and then accessing their bank accounts for the attorney's own personal benefit. It can be subtle simply over charging someone for care or gardening or housekeeping duties. It can take a variety of forms of pressure and coercion and on occasions may turn into the threat of physical violence. It may even take the form that the abuser doesn't seek benefit for themselves, but for members of the abuser's family.

Of course, as long as elderly family members have appropriate mental capacity they should take whatever decisions they wish. The issues arise when they are unduly influenced, coerced or 'taken advantage of'.

Families who only come into physical contact with elderly relatives occasionally can often become suspicious that the relative may be the subject of financial scamming or just a well-meaning carer, neighbour or friend who may have too much involvement with finances. Do you suspect this may be happening?

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2025 Cross Bay Walk

ISAs – How many different types are there?

An Individual Savings Account (ISA) is a tax-efficient way for UK residents to save or invest money. Each tax year, you can contribute up to a maximum limit (currently £20,000 for adults) across different types of ISA. They are accepted as being a flexible and efficient way to grow your savings as they allow you to earn interest on your savings, or returns on investments without having to pay tax on any income, dividends, or capital gains. There are different types of ISAs; each of which is designed with a different purpose:-

- Cash ISA: These ISAs are similar to a traditional savings account but with tax-free interest. They are generally low-risk and suitable for shorter term savings.
- Stocks and Shares ISA's allow you to invest in the stock market, bonds, or in investment funds. They offer the potential for higher returns in the longer term but they are generally higher risk than cash ISAs as the value can fall, as well as rise.
- Lifetime ISA: Typically for savers aged 18-39 who are saving for their first home, or retirement. The government adds a 25% bonus to your contributions, up to £1,000 per year.
- Junior ISA: A tax-free savings account for children under 18, which can be converted into an adult ISA at age 18
- 5. Innovative Finance ISA: Involves peer-to-peer lending and other innovative investments. Higher risk compared to Cash ISAs.

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Grange Community Orchard

On Saturday the 25th January the Grange Community Orchard was the meeting place for over 20 visitors from the South Lakeland Orchard Group to learn pruning techniques.

The Community Orchard was created in1997 by the Town Councillor, Aiden Smith: school children planted many of the trees which had been donated by local people and businesses. Many of the existing trees were local to the area, such as Lord Derby, Duke of Devonshire and Merryweather Damson. Over the intervening years many more trees have been added by local groups, societies and the Town Council.

Each tree is labelled with the name of

the variety, its origin and whether it is a cooker or eater. All the fruit is available to the local community. At the present time it is looked after by four volunteers who do the planting, weeding and recording.

Each February the trees are pruned hard back by David Rodes to keep them at a suitable height for picking.

The land is owned by Westmorland and Furness Council who maintain the grass, but each year we need to find money for the cost of pruning, fence posts, netting etc. As it is a town asset, maybe the Town Council would fund these costs of £300.

Grange Prom High tide bird watch

On World Wetland Day, 2 February, members of Grange and District Natural History Society gathered in numbers at the Kents Bank end of Grange Prom to watch the spectacle as the high spring tide forced flocks of wading birds from their feeding grounds in the Bay.

32 species of birds were seen, with 250 Widgeon ducks. It was good to see so many curlew, redshank, shelduck and pintail. We had good views of the elusive Snipe and Water Rail. Thanks to Martin Chadwick for organising this.

Lynne Farrell gave a thought-provoking presentation on the flowers of Arnside Knott. She explained that the Knott has many varied habitats, because of its limestone rock and proximity to the sea. It is very special for flowers, with many orchids and 27 species

of ferns. Recording flowers through the seasons, she asked us which plants might increase or decrease in the future, given the changing climate and other pressures. Lynne emphasised how important it is to record the wildflowers that we see now in order to monitor the changes.

Grange Town Council Approves Budget for 2025 -2026.

At the Council's meeting on Monday 13 January, Grange Town Councillors discussed and agreed the budget for 2025-26. They then voted to request the income from Westmorland and Furness Council who organise the council tax and collect the money. This money is called the precept.

The precept is converted into amounts for each different council tax band, and this is added onto residents' council tax bills, along with charges levied on behalf of Westmorland and Furness Council, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Cumbria Police, and the Cumbria Fire and Rescue Authority.

Town Councillors agreed to request a precept of £261,559.

For those living in a Band D property, the contribution to the Town Council's budget will be $\pounds 109.35$ for the year — an increase of 38p per month.

Households in other council tax bands will see a higher or lower contribution depending on their property's band.

Since last year, more than two hundred new households were registered to pay council tax in Grange, so this spreads the load.

The budget includes funding for key subsidised services that enhance life in Grange.

These include the Victoria Hall, three blocks of public conveniences, two allotment sites, the recreation ground on the promenade, the summer band concerts, the Christmas lights display and the services of the Lengthsman.

The Town Council remains committed to maintaining these amenities, which are crucial to both residents and visitors alike.

Councillors were aware of several financial factors while setting the budget. The increase in National Insurance contributions, following the October 2024 Government budget, had an impact. The withdrawal of the £7,850 annual Westmorland and Furness Council Tax Grant, which has previously helped supplement the council tax demand, presented a further challenge.

The Victoria Hall continues to be a vital cultural hub for the town.

The Council has made provision for staff recruitment to operate the Hall and funding to promote the Hall as a venue, including new signage, and improvements to the Hall's website and social media presence.

In addition to these core services, the Town Council continues to support community groups through grants distributed via the Bay Villa Trust, a fund separate from the council tax precept. These grants help support local initiatives and projects that benefit the community.

WILD GARLIC PESTO

We're adding a Cumbrian twist to this seasonal wild garlic pesto recipe by featuring locally sourced Eden Yard rapeseed oil and Holbrook cheese from Holker Farm Dairy.

Eden Yard's cold-pressed extra virgin rapeseed oil, grown in the Eden Valley, offers a mild, nutty taste and is high in vitamin E and omega fatty acids. Holbrook, crafted by Nicola Robinson at Holker Farm, is a firm, sharp goat's cheese with deep herbaceous notes, adding unique depth to this pesto.

Pair it with pasta, spread it on crusty sourdough, or enjoy it alongside grilled meats and vegetables.

INGREDIENTS

- 100g wild garlic leaves
- 50g Holbrook cheese, finely grated
- 50g pine nuts
- 150ml Eden Yard rapeseed oil
- · Juice of half a lemon
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

METHOD

- 1. Wash the wild garlic leaves thoroughly and pat them dry.
- 2. In a dry frying pan, lightly toast the pine nuts until golden brown, then set aside to cool.
- 3. Place the wild garlic leaves, toasted pine nuts, and grated Holbrook cheese into a food processor.
- 4. Pulse a few times to combine the ingredients.
- 5. With the processor running, slowly add the Eden Yard rapeseed oil until the mixture reaches your desired consistency.
- 6. Add the lemon juice, and season with salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste.
- 7. Transfer the pesto to a clean jar, cover it with a thin layer of rapeseed oil, and store it in the refrigerator for up to a week.

PROPOSED 20MPH SPEED LIMITS -PROJECT UPDATE

Following the recent South Lakeland Locality Board meeting (W&FC) held on the 29th January 2025, a decision was made on the next steps to progress the proposals for 20mph in Allithwaite. A report was presented to the Board that outlined the outcome of the initial consultation and presented a series of recommendations in relation to the progression of proposals.

The South Lakeland Locality Board approved the following proposals to progress to statutory consultation and advertisement of the proposed Traffic Regulation Order (TRO):

 Allithwaite; Ambleside; Coniston; Gleaston; Great and Little Urswick; Natland; Oxenholme; Sedgwick and Swarthmoor

More information can be found in the report (agenda item 8), available on the Council's website (Agenda for South Lakeland Locality Board on Wednesday, 29th January, 2025, 6.00 pm I Westmorland and Furness Council).

W&FC are now working to finalise the proposed TRO documents and aim to launch the statutory consultation in the coming weeks. W&FC aim to complete the statutory process in time for a decision on implementation at the Locality Board meeting in April 2025. However, the timeline is quite short and depends on several factors aligning.

Cartmel was selected as one of the identified schemes to be progressed in 2025/26. The team is currently preparing draft designs, considering the areas highlighted in our application (ACPC), and the Council's 20mph speed limit policy.

DOORSTEP CRIME AWARENESS

Doorstep crime refers to rogue traders, bogus callers and distraction burglary. During the pandemic, many rogue traders have adapted by moving online.

Are you looking to hire a tradesperson?

Many rogue traders have adapted to operate online by creating fake profiles to target consumers with their fraudulent services. Always do your research. Consider looking online for trusted trader schemes or ask your local authority for advice on what's available in your area.

What is doorstep crime?

Doorstep crime refers to rogue traders, bogus callers and distraction burglary. Whilst we do have genuine callers at our doors, there are also those that aim to exploit people in their homes. This type of crime includes people that knock on your door offering fraudulent services, being overcharged for services, as well as false use of logos or ID that appear to be genuine.

Targeting victims

Criminals often target when they believe their victims are in a more vulnerable state, and therefore more susceptible to being taken advantage of. There are many situations in which a person could feel more vulnerable than usual, such as a bereavement, the aftermath of severe weather, or even just being in a rush.

Preventing criminals

Criminals may be deterred from approaching your property if you make it clear that they are not welcome. Consider looking into doorbell cameras for extra surveillance if you are concerned. You can create a 'no cold calling' sign to put in your window or consider checking with your local authority to see if they have any stickers available.

Game-Changer: Grange Girls' Football Scores Big with Fibrus Grant

Dozens of young girls in Grange have the opportunity to develop their football skills, thanks to funding from the Fibrus Play It Forward Fund.

The grant is an extra boost for the already rapid growth of girls' football at Grange United Junior Football Club. The club introduced its first girls' team just five years ago, following an initiative led by the Football Association to encourage more young girls to take up the sport.

Tracy Hathorn, who sits on the football club's board and also oversees all of the girls' teams, admits they started very small.

"We managed to get nine girls on board back then," she recalls.

Since then, the club has grown faster than anyone dared imagine, and now proudly boasts more than 70 girls as part of its teams.

Tracy says: "We run competitive teams for under-15s, under-13s and under-10s girls, with a new under-eights girls team.



"We also have the Wildcats, a 'just-for-fun' team for girls aged five to 11, with the hope some of them may join the league as they get more and more into it."

However, this rapid growth – coupled with an increase in the boys' teams too, as this year Grange United has two under-eight boys' teams for the first time – comes at a cost

"Each team needs its own equipment – footballs, cones, bibs etc," admits Tracy. "So for every new team, there is a cost. This year was the largest equipment bill the club has ever had."

They applied to the Play It Forward Fund, which was set up by Fibrus to support the communities it works with in Cumbria and Northern Ireland, and encourage young people to put down their electronic devices and get outside and get active.

Now in its second year, the fund has now allocated more than $\pounds100,000$ to grassroots sports – including almost $\pounds40,000$ in Cumbria.

Grange United Junior Football Club, which has a catchment across Grangeover-Sands, Allithwaite, Cartmel, Flookburgh, Newby Bridge, Levens and Cark, was one of the grassroots clubs to receive a grant in the latest round of funding.

Tracy says: "We are so grateful to Fibrus, because this grant has paid for a whole host of new equipment: training balls, match balls, pop-up goals and cones are just some of the things we needed to buy.

"We want to encourage anyone who wants to play football to get involved, but we would have struggled without this grant. It's made the world of difference to us."

Linda McMillan, Chief People Officer at Fibrus, said: "We are passionate about the Play It Forward Fund because we understand how vital these community clubs are, especially in rural areas like Cumbria.

"The growth of girls' football at Grange United is phenomenal, and we are delighted to support them as they continue to go from strength to strength."

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
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
